Colonel Jack Diekman will be Memorial Day Speaker

Colonel Jack L. Diekman, USAF Retired, will be the speaker at the Cunningham Memorial Day tributes on May 27th.

Colonel Diekman is a native Kansan. He was born in Wichita and grew up in Douglass, graduating from Douglass High School in 1960. He is a graduate of Kansas State University. He entered the United States Air Force through the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps Program at Kansas State University, graduating as a Distinguished Graduate in a 1964.

His first assignment was to the 3320th Air Technical Training Center at Amarillo Air Force Base in Texas. He attended Squadron Officer School in January 1968. Upon graduation, he was assigned to HQ United States Forces Korea (USFK). While there he was selected as the aide to the Chief of Staff, USFK. Upon returning to the States, he was assigned as the Executive Officer to the Directorate of Plans, HQ, USAF, Pentagon, Washington, D.C. for the next five years.

Diekman was then selected to attend George Washington University through the Air Force Institute of Technology, where he earned a Master of Business Administration – Personnel Management Degree. Upon graduation he was promoted to Major and assigned to HQ Air Reserve Personnel Center (ARPC), Lowery AFB, Colorado, where he served in the Information Management Office, Reserve Officer Career Management and later selected to serve as Executive Office to the Commander, ARPC. He was then selected to attend Armed Forces Staff College, Norfolk, Virginia, where he graduated as a Distinguished Graduate and was selected in 1979 to be Executive Officer to the Commander of US Forces Japan and Commander, 5th Air Force, Yokota

Air Base Japan.

During this assignment, he was promoted to Lt. Colonel. The following assignment was to the Directorate of Plans and Programs at HQ Pacific Air Forces (PACAF) in 1983 at Hickam AFB Honolulu, Hawaii. Where there he was selected for promotion to Colonel and reassigned as Executive Officer to the Commander of U.S. Air Forces Europe and AF Central Europe Ramstein Air Base, Germany. In 1987 he was selected as Installation Commander of RAF Chicksands in the United Kingdom. While there he earned the American Ambassador’s Award for his “Outstanding Efforts in furthering cordial community relations in the United Kingdom, thereby strengthening the Anglo-American alliance.”

In 1989, after he and his family had spent 10 consecutive years overseas, he was assigned to HQ Tactical Air Command (TAC) Langley AFB, Virginia, in the office of Information Management until his retirement in September 1992.

He married Bonnie J. Sterling of Altoona, Pennsylvania in 1971. They have one daughter, Dorene, who lives in Torrance, California.

YEARS AGO IN

The Cunningham Clipper

May 8, 1969 – The Service of Dedication of the carillon bells was conducted at the United Methodist Church in Cunningham, Sunday afternoon, May 4, at 3:00 o'clock, and attended by a large crowd.

The program included the prelude by Organist Mrs. Bill Bradley, followed by the hymn, "God of Our Fathers," and the responsive reading, led by Rev. Henry G. Dutcher, and concluded with the Gloria Patri.

Rev. Dutcher gave the prayer of dedication, after which the church choir sang, "When Thou Prayest." Bill Bradley, in behalf of Mrs. Burnett, presented the memorial plaque to the church. Accepting for the church was Frank Cain Jr., Chairman of the Official Board. Mrs. Bradley played the carillon dedicatory hymn, after which Rev. Dutcher gave the prayer of acceptance.

Linda Cain sang "I Was a Tree," followed by the prayer of remembrance by Fr. Eugene Robl, pastor of the Sacred Heart Church. The service was concluded with the girls' ensemble singing "Peace I Leave With You," and the benediction by Rev. Dutcher, and the postlude by Mrs. Bradley.

Cheerleaders for next year were elected this week at Cunningham High School.

The "A" team cheerleaders are Bonnie Albers, Kris Sheldon, Rogene Cooley, and Kathy Sallee. The "B" team cheerleaders are Jill Rose, Barbie Cornelius, and Mary Ann Albers.

Gene Albers was elected President of the Student Council for the 1969-70 school year.

May 7, 1964 – Two Cunningham Rural High School boys, Lowell Gridley and Dennis Young, and a Kingman Rural High School girl, Linda Brown, won first, second, and third, respectively, in the Kingman Rod-E-O at Kingman last Saturday, sponsored annually by the Kingman Jaycees.

Seventeen teen-age drivers were entered in the rod-e-o, which involves driving an automobile about virtually am "obstacle" course.

The annual meeting of stockholders of the Cairo Co-operative Equity Exchange was held in the Glendale School last Saturday evening.

The Glendale and Cairo ladies prepared and served dinner to 350 members and their families.

Loren Cooley and Lee Hamm were elected to the exchange's board of directors.

The response to the Red Cross Bloodmobile at the Sacred Heart

School Auditorium, Monday, was the best Cunningham has ever had, with 59 pints of blood received.

Six new names were added to the list of donors giving blood for the first time. They included Mrs. Ethel Dunn, Ralph Baber, Paul Burris, James Lupo, Mrs. Eugene Freund, and Mrs. Chet Spade.

Among the two-gallon donors were Robert Stillwell Jr. of Penalosa, and Lawrence Oeding of Zenda, while one-gallon donors included Herman J. Rohling, Benny Lee Bock, Richard M. Molitor, Mrs. Dick Strohl, August Meyers, Mrs. Billie Delores Henman, Mrs. Alva Hellar, and Kathleen Cummings of Wichita, Red Cross Field Representative.

May 7, 1959 – Rainfall totaling almost four inches fell in the Cunningham community, Monday afternoon, evening, and throughout the night.

The driving rain was accompanied by gusty winds and a bit of hail, and this entire area of the state was alerted for possible tornadic action during the storm.

A tornado was reported in the air near Waldock, west of Cairo, and considerable damage was done by high winds in and near Cairo and at the Archie Scott farm northwest of Cunningham.

Gene Thoms of Arlington will be the new manager of the Cunningham branch of the Cairo Co-op Equity Exchange.

Mr. Thoms is a farmer near Arlington, and is married to the former Mary Frances Tope of Cunningham.

Manager Art Baker of Cairo, will continue to manage all three of the co-op's elevators and installations at Cairo, Waldock, and Cunningham.

Mike Schnittker returned home a week ago Tuesday from Great Falls, Mont., where he had been taking the car to his son Lennie.

Lennie is a pitcher in professional baseball for the Great Falls team in the Pioneer League.

While in Great Falls, Mr. Schnittker attended a game between Great Falls and Billings, Mont. The temperature was a cool Montana 40 degrees, and despite a heavy coat and additional clothing, Mike said

he was still cold even with numerous cups of hot coffee.

He returned home by plane on Tuesday with Lennie expected to pitch the Wednesday night game. Since his return home, a letter has been received from Lennie saying he pitched and won his first professional baseball game, but got his biggest thrill when he smashed a triple in his first time at bat in the game.

The annual Junior-Senior Banquet was held in the High School Library, last Saturday evening.

May 6, 1954 – The Boy Scouts of the Quivera Council of Wichita, proved that their resourcefulness and knowledge of outdoor life learned in their Boy Scout work was of great value to them at their annual Boy Scout Camporee held at the Kingman County State Lake near Calista last Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. Over three hundred scouts and leaders from this district were present at the camporee and stuck it out despite miserable weather throughout the weekend, which included hail, rain, and cold weather.

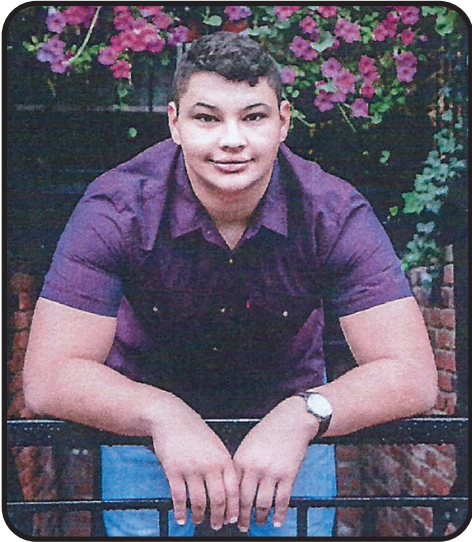

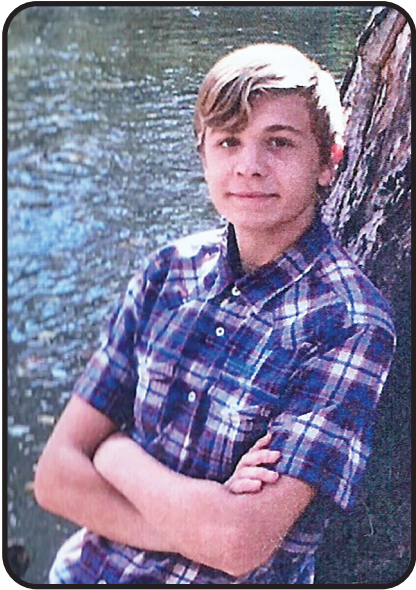

County Commission Meeting April 29th, 2018

The Board of Kingman County Commissioners met in the Commissioners' Meeting Room, Kingman County Courthouse, Kingman, Kansas on April 29th, 2019. Those present: John Steffen, Chairman; Fred Foley, Commissioner; Jerry Henning, Commissioner; Carol Noblit, County Clerk; John Caton, County Counselor

Visitors: Jason Jump, Kingman Leader Courier; Carol Voran; Gayle Dye; Michael Gillaspie, OneOK; Bill Vanlandingham; Roger Rickard; Amy Livingston and Leroy Fouse.

Staff: Linda Langley, Internal Auditor; Susan Hubbell, Register of Deeds; Stan Goetz, HR/Planning/Director; Mendy Frampton, Kingman Expo Center Executive Director; Charles Arensdorf, Public Works Director.

Chairman Steffen called the Board of County Commissioners Meeting to order at 8:00 a.m.

MOTION: Commissioner Henning moved to approve the agenda as presented. Commissioner

Foley seconded the motion. The motion was approved with a unanimous vote of the County Commissioners.

MOTION: Commissioner Foley moved to approve the County Commissioner meeting minutes of April 22nd, 2019. Commissioner Henning seconded the motion. The motion was approved upon the unanimous vote of the County Commissioners.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Chairman Steffen moved to go into executive session at 8:06 a.m. with John Caton, County Counselor for potential litigation pursuant to the exception under the Kansas Open Meetings Act for discussion of matters which would be deemed privileged under the attorney-client relationship. The County Commissioners returned to regular session at 8:16 a.m. with no binding action taken.

MOTION: Commissioner Foley moved to approve sending letters to Senator Roberts, Senator Moran and Congressman Estes in opposition of the CABT. Commissioner Henning seconded the

motion. The motion was approved upon the unanimous vote of the County Commissioners.

The County Commissioners discussed the vacant lots owned by the County and asked Mr. Caton to put something together to be able to put them up for sale.

The County Commissioners signed vouchers for the Road & Bridge in the amount of \$34,959.43.

The County Commissioners signed vouchers for the County in the amount of \$164,043.61.

Linda Langley, Internal Auditor was in to discuss cash funds with the County Commissioners.

Ms. Langley discussed the 2020 Budget Calendar with the County Commissioners.

Michael Gillaspie, OneOk Pipeline was in to give an overview of the Northline 7 Extension with the County Commissioners. Mr. Gillaspie let them know that there is 24 miles in Kingman County which follows current lines through the County on the East side. Mr. Gillaspie said that they are expected to be completed by mid-summer 2020.

Mr. Gillaspie gave the Commissioners his contact information if there are any questions.

Susan Hubbell, Register of Deeds was in to discuss renewal of Garber Surveying Service for 2019. MOTION: Commissioner Foley moved to approve the renewal of Garber Surveying Services for 2019. Commissioner Henning seconded the motion. The motion was approved upon the unanimous vote of the County Commissioners.

Ms. Hubbell let them know she attended another KAC meeting last Friday and they are close to having a new Director of KAC hopefully by June.

Stan Goetz was in to discuss information that he received from his meeting last week.

Mr. Goetz gave the Commissioners correspondence received from AFP Renewables letting them know that they have purchased the Windfarm III and Windfarm IV from Sempra.

Mr. Goetz discussed the nuisance he currently has in Murdock.

Mr. Goetz brought in a request from Becky

Luntsford, County Treasurer to hire Trina Wilkerson part-time for the Summer until a new employee can be hired.

Roger Rickard, Bill Vanlandingham and Amy Livingston were in to discuss the Kingman Heritage Hall of Honor.

Mr. Rickard talked about what the Hall of Honor could do for the community if done right. Also, Mr. Rickard discussed the board members for this project. A few portraits were shown that would be hung in the Hall of Honor.

Mr. Vanlandingham discussed that they are planning to form a 501c3 for the Kingman Heritage Hall of Honor.

MOTION: Commissioner Henning moved to approve letting Mr. Rickard and the Heritage Hall of Honor place their portraits in the Kingman Expo Center. Commissioner Foley seconded the motion. The motion was approved by a unanimous vote of the County Commissioners.

Charles Arensdorf, Public Works Director was in to discuss personnel. The Commissioners told Mr. Arensdorf and Stan Goetz to move forward with the hiring of an employee.

Mr. Arensdorf submitted his March 2019 Budget Reports for review by the County Commissioners.

Mr. Arensdorf let the Commissioners know that Mendy Frampton had called him to ask about pricing on the Solid Waste fees for the Expo Center. The Commissioners discussed it and would do some checking.

Mr. Arensdorf reviewed quotes for Power Broom Rental from Berry Tractor with an option to purchase with the Commissioners. The monthly rent is 2,400.00 and the purchase price is \$59,323.00.

The Commissioners discussed the LEC agreement that they currently hold with the City.

The Commissioners discussed The Law Company contract and will discuss more next week with The Law Company.

Leroy Fouse and Mark Schnittker were in to discuss the windows for the Heritage Trust Grant project. Mr. Fouse said that most of the windows are in and he will be here full time until the windows are done.

The meeting adjourned at 12:25 p.m.



Wheat Tour: Day 2 Wrap-Up

On Wednesday, 75 people on the Wheat Quality Council's 2019 winter wheat tour in 20 cars made their way from Colby to Wichita, Kansas, stopping in wheat fields along six different routes. One route included a trip to northern Oklahoma, as well.

While everyone thinks of Kansas wheat being used mainly for breads, it's not just bread bakeries on the tour. Other participants included grain companies, flour mills, government agencies, wheat growers and other food manufacturers.

Also on the tour were several Kansas wheat farmers, including Gary Millershaski of Lakin, who were able to interact with these major customers and tell them the story of the American farmer.

"The connections that we make on this tour are unlike anything else," said Millershaski. "Having producers and our customers driving around in the same vehicles, there's just a lot of information that gets shared both ways. It helps them learn about the challenges of production and

the frustration of the prices we get, and we get to learn about the changing dynamics between them and their customers. It helps to put faces to the wheat they receive. We're not a number to them after the tour... We're real."

Wednesday's 20 cars of wheat tour scouts made 200 stops at wheat fields across western, central and southern Kansas, and into northern counties in Oklahoma

Scouts reported seeing widely varying wheat conditions (due, in large part, to planting date) along the route. While there were sightings of rust and other disease in south central Kansas, many stops saw signs of nitrogen deficiency, a common nutrient deficiency that could be remedied by fertilizer applications. However, many producers are choosing not to apply fertilizers due to decreasing wheat prices and increased input costs. This year the yield bump with fertilizer application may end up costing producers more than they would gain.

"The wheat that looks good looks really good," said Millershaski. "But there are a large chunk of fields that weren't able to be planted in a typical time frame. These fields just aren't developing normally, there's no root structure. I can see the potential for a lot of abandoned acres. We're going to need every acre harvested that we can get to be right at an average crop year."

The next few weeks will be critical for the crop. Dr. Romulo Lollato,

Kansas State University wheat extension specialist, reported seeing signs of leaf rust in the lower canopy in Ford and Edwards counties, but saw both nitrogen and sulfur deficiencies consistently along the Highway 50 route. One tweet from Hodgeman County showed a substantial difference in growth and development in neighboring fields. Non-typical planting dates have been at the forefront of conversation for Wheat Tour 19 with the visible variability in field development evident even to the untrained eye. Tour participants now have a hands on experience showcasing the volatility of Mother Nature and the impact it has on our nation's wheat farmers.

The calculated yield from all cars was 47.6 bushels per acre, but at the Wednesday evening wrap-up meeting, tour scouts again talked about the wheat being behind schedule and very small.

Mark Hodges from Oklahoma reported that the state's production is estimated at 119.27 million bushels with 37.38 bushels per acre. Approximately 4.2 million acres were seeded last fall.

Wheat Tour 19 continues Thursday with six routes between Wichita and Manhattan, Kansas. Follow along with the tour at #wheatour19. A final production estimate will be announced Thursday afternoon.

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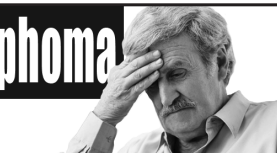

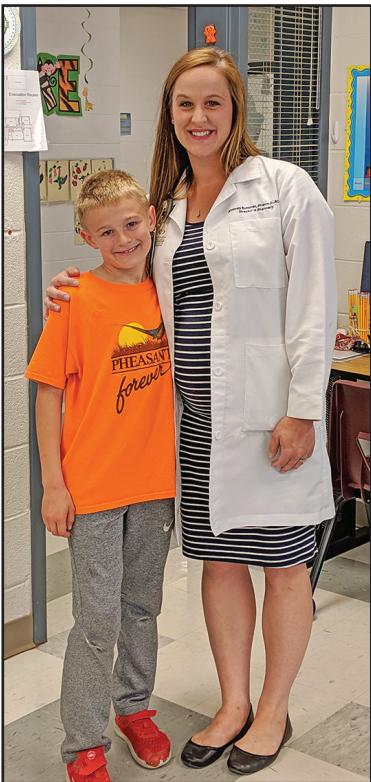
Ms. Helm Visits Second Grade
