The Kingman County Health Department now has flu vaccine and will be available to the public starting Monday, October 7.

Just about anyone who is 6 months and older should get the flu vaccine. Even though flu symptoms are generally not seen until around January to March, it is important to start thinking about prevention now, so your body is ready to combat flu symptoms when Flu Season is in full swing.

Symptoms of the flu usually come on quickly and pack a more powerful punch than the common cold:

Sneezing, stuffy nose, and sore throat

Body aches, headache

Fever and chills

Chest discomfort, shortness of breath, and cough

Death is also possible

Flu can lead to long-term health problems or make already-existing health conditions worse. Vaccination is the best way to prevent the flu. Of course, in addition to the vaccine, handwashing and avoiding sick people

helps prevent spread of flu. Also, it is important to stay home if you are sick. You are not only not helping yourself get well, but everyone around you is at risk of getting sick- there may be someone nearby who may become seriously ill or perhaps die from the flu!

Many people are concerned that the flu vaccine makes them sick and refuse to get it. Some people do develop a low-grade fever and might not feel well after getting vaccinated- this is an immune response to the vaccine- it's working to prevent true flu! Our bodies develop full immunity within 2 weeks after getting the vaccine. Some people do have more of an immune response to the vaccine than others. Tylenol or Ibuprofen help with these concerns. The antibody response typically doesn't come near to the severity of real flu illness!

USDA Invests
\$4.99 Million
in Kingman
Community
Hospital

Topeka, Kan., – U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development State Director in Kansas, Lynne Hinrichsen, announced that the agency will be providing a \$4.99 million loan to Ninnescan Valley Health Systems Inc. in Kingman, Kan., to renovate the Kingman Community Hospital.

“Kansans across the state want access to quality health care close to home,” said Hinrichsen. “USDA Rural Development is committed to assisting rural communities in finding innovation solutions for quality health care in the region.”

USDA financing will be used to renovate the 50-year-old Kingman Community Hospital and a medical arts building. A specialty clinic will be expanded, and the oncology department, admissions area and business office will be upgraded. This project will improve functionality for staff and patients of the hospital.

USDA is making the investment through the Community Facilities Direct Loan Program. More than 100 types of projects are eligible for Community Facilities program funding. Eligible applicants include municipalities, public bodies, nonprofit organizations and federally recognized Native American tribes. Projects must be in rural areas with a population of 20,000 or less.

Nationally, USDA announced \$139 million in 56 projects that were funded today to improve community facilities and provide essential services for 3.3 million rural residents in 23 states.

In April 2017, President Donald J. Trump established the Interagency Task Force on Agriculture and Rural Prosperity to identify legislative, regulatory and policy changes that could promote agriculture and prosperity in rural communities. In January 2018, Secretary Perdue presented the Task Force's findings to President Trump. These findings included 31 recommendations to align the federal government with state, local and tribal governments to take advantage of opportunities that exist in rural America.

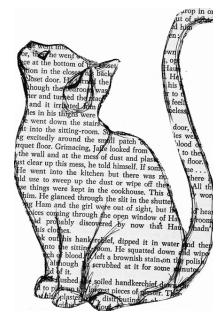

Meanderings

Have you all noticed the mistakes on the pages of the Courier these last two or three weeks? Good grief! I read over the pages, looking for grammatical errors (especially in the headlines), I look for missing credit lines, I look to make sure the photos have a black edge, I check the dates and make sure the ads that are paying to be in the paper are actually in the paper. I must look at each page 50 plus times in the course of finishing a weekly paper.

I usually feel good about the paper after it’s done and sent off. Mistakes, I tell myself, are at a minimum. Thursday morn, early and sometimes not so bright, I come to the office, open that first bundle of papers, pull out a paper, and AAAUGHHH! Error here, Error there. Here an error, there an error, everywhere an error, error... or maybe just one or two.

Sigh. Maybe the next paper will be better.

I put the paper together on a computer program called “InDesign”. The program has blue lines to indicate columns. There are rulers to the side. There are many handy tools for fonts and sizing and colors and fixing photos...it’s a great program. I use all these tools to make a presentable paper, and when a page is done, I click on a little icon and all the extraneous lines disappear, and I proofread the page. Then I save that page and export it to a file to be emailed to Hutch News for printing. After I’ve exported a page, it comes up in a PDF file (portable document format) and I proofread it again. And usually make several changes.

Then I let it be until I am ready to email (usually late Wednesday evenings). After I’ve attached all the pages to an email, I open each page and proof it again; make any changes (which means I have to go back in the newspaper program, fix the mistakes, save, export, reattach.) After all is proofread AGAIN, I send it through cyberspace and in just a few minutes it arrives at the Hutchinson News printing press.

Sometimes they call and tell me I have the wrong dates on some pages (AUGH!); they have called me to tell me I forgot to attach the pages (double AUGH!); and a couple of times they called to tell me an ad didn’t come out correctly. When I don’t hear anything, I breathe a sigh of relief, measure all the ads, enter the information into the mail report, print up the mail reports and the mailing labels. Then I put the paper on the website, send a quick note out to my on-line subscribers, post to Facebook, down-

load it to the Kansas Press Association website, and go home....where I lay awake and worry about mistakes. After over a year of this, I have finally, FINALLY, learned that if mistakes are made, there is nothing I can do about it while I am in bed worrying about them. The paper is being printed at the time, and it is what it is, and my readers have come to understand that I am me, and I make mistakes.

I have thought about purposely making a mistake on the front page to see if my readers can find it. Wait, though, I thought, if I do that, and don’t catch a mistake that’s already on the page, that will mean I’ll have TWO mistakes on the page. Okay. Then I should make two mistakes and see if the readers catch them... but what happens if there is actually a mistake on the page? Then there will three mistakes on the page. Nevermind!

I have decided to just let it be. When I was working for Jeff on the paper he told me, “When we put out a perfect paper, it’s probably time to quit.” You can tell from all the mistakes I make, this paper is not going to be folding anytime soon.

Now, on to noteworthy events. Last Tuesday evening, Teri Orth, Mary Oller, Kay House, Darlene Schreck, and I ventured to Pratt for the first season’s concert of the Pratt Concert series.

Cunningham Edges Skyline

by Coach Bart Ricke The Cunningham Jr. High football Wildcats traveled to HOPL rival Skyline on Thursday, September 26, 2019 to take on the undefeated Thunderbirds. Skyline took the opening kick-off and methodically marched down the field and scored the game’s first touchdown, all while chewing up all but 1:36 of the first quarter. On the ensuing kick-off the T-birds succeeded on an onside kick and the defense was sent back on the field. This possession took the remainder of the quarter, but the Wildcats were able to get a stop and took over possession

of the ball for the first time of the game early in the second quarter. With score still 8-0 in favor of Skyline, Luke McGuire was able to break loose of a Skyline tackler and scramble 55 yards for the Wildcats first TD, McGuire would then hook up with Jack Ruckle on a pass for the two-point conversion and the score stood at 8-8. CJH was able to force a fumble on the kick-off but were unable to score before half-time leaving the score tied going into the locker room. In the third quarter the Wildcats took their first lead of the game at the 3:09 mark on a 6 yard run by McGuire, the Wildcats however failed on the

all-important PAT, but led 14-8. Just over two minutes later after getting the ball back, McGuire scampered 39 yards to extend the lead to 20-8, again Cunningham failed the two-point conversion. Midway through the fourth quarter Skyline would answer with a long run of their own and cut into the Cunningham lead, after the two-point PAT Skyline trailed by just four points 20-16. Cunningham got the ball back hoping to score and put the game away, but was unable to muster enough offense to do so eventually giving it back to Skyline for one last attempt to take the lead. After a holding penalty Skyline faced a fourth

and ten just past mid-field, the Wildcat defense rose to the occasion and got a stop. With just over two minutes left in the game Cunningham looked to ice the game away, but to do so they would need to get a least one first down and they did just that and took a knee on the game’s final two plays to come away with a 20-16 win. The win marked the second straight year when the game vs. Skyline came down to the last possession with the Wildcats winning both. The win gave Skyline their first loss of the season and moved the Wildcat record to 4-0.

Cunningham Defeats the A&A Titans

by Coach Bart Ricke The Cunningham Wildcat Jr. high football team got a taste of Monday night football on September 30, 2019 when they played host to the Attica/Argonia Titans and came away with a 32-8 win. The Wildcats led 14-0 after the first quarter on

two touchdown runs by Luke McGuire, the first on a 1 yard plunge and the second on a 34 yard run, Dagim Reed ran in the PAT of the first TD, but the Wildcats failed on the second. The second quarter was a little sluggish for the Wildcat offense, so the defense would step up as Will Wegerer would get an interception and the Wildcats overall continued to hold the Titans scoreless. However with

16 seconds left in the half, McGuire would throw a long pass down-field to Reed and he was able to make a move and get into the end-zone for a 33 yard TD pass/reception to extend the half time lead to 20-0. The Wildcats would extend their lead to 26-0 in the third quarter on a 46 yard run by Reed. A&A was able to get on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter when a receiver got behind the Wildcat

defense and raced to the end-zone to reduce the lead to 26-8. The lead however was quickly extended back to 26 points when Reed once again found the end-zone after a 42 yard scamper bringing the final score to 32-8. The win extended the Wildcats record to 5-0 on the season. The Wildcats will face an undefeated Norwich team at home on Thursday, October 10.

Now That’s
Rural

Phil and Sharron
Knox, AgSun

Would you like corn flakes for breakfast? Cows would like corn flakes for breakfast, too. Today we’ll learn about an innovative Kansas farm family that is utilizing a steam flaking technology to improve feed quality for their livestock operation and others around Kansas.

Phil and Sharron Knox farm in northwest Kansas. Phil is a native of the Brewster area. He went to Kansas State and majored in agricultural economics. While attending a Farm Bureau scholarship dinner, he met Sharron who was studying dietetics. The

two married and began a long life together.

Phil went on to earn a master’s and Ph.D. in agricultural economics from the University of California at Berkeley, where Sharron earned her master’s in public health nutrition. She worked as a consulting nutritionist and Phil took a position as assistant professor at Colorado State before moving back to his family farm near Brewster.

Today, the family farming operation consists of no-till corn and wheat on 9,000 acres of which 1,800 acres are irrigated. They also have a 200 head cow and calf operation on 2,100 acres of pasture land. The cattle are finished, along with purchased calves, in a 2,500-head feed lot. The fed cattle are marketed through the Knox’s membership in U.S. Premium Beef.

“You have to do things a little better, you have to change,” Phil said.

“He does research, he

has ideas,” Sharron said. “I’m a detail person.”

One of Phil’s ideas was to improve the feed efficiency of his cattle feeding operation. “I talked to a friend who was working in feed technology,” Phil said. That led to the creation of a steam flaking enterprise in 2004.

Feed corn is converted into flakes by processing in a steam chamber. This breaks down the cell walls and gelatinizes the starch. The result has proven to be a highly desirable cattle feed. In fact, the feed worked so well that the Knoxes not only feed the flakes to their own cattle, they market the flakes to other feedlots and dairies in western Kansas.

The flaking business is known as AgSun LLC. The company’s flakes have been shown to be a better source of energy than rolled or ground corn because cattle digest and utilize the flakes better. For feeder cattle, the flakes allow up to a 15

percent improvement in energy values.

For dairy cattle, starch availability is also improved, giving cows a better source of energy. This produces more energy for more milk production.

AgSun LLC has the capacity to process 2.5 million bushels of corn a year, with one third of that coming from the Knox’s own production. Their son Daniel, an industrial engineering graduate of K-State, helped design the automated controls and programming for the equipment. It is a state-of-the-art, computer-operated facility. The production from the plant could feed up to 40,000 to 50,000 head per day.

“The staff at AgSun is hard-working, friendly and always willing to help us,” said one customer. “The flakes are the best quality for our cattle.”

Another customer commented: “The quality of the product is second to none and is al-

ways very consistent. AgSun produces what they advertise and they do things the right way the first time. Our production is always good with AgSun’s cornflakes in our ration. We appreciate their service.”

Sharron is a board member of the Northwest Kansas Farm Management Association. Phil has served on the Northwest Kansas Groundwater Management Board. They are members of Kansas Farm Bureau and Kansas Corn Growers.

“We felt called to do more,” Phil said. He also serves as the volunteer pastor at the local Lutheran church.

“We enjoy living here, it’s like a big family,” Sharron said. Brewster is a rural community with a population of 305 people. Now, that’s rural.

Factors to Consider When Planting Wheat

Wheat’s potential is affected by soil temperature, moisture, timing, depth and seeding rates

It’s September, so you know what that means: time to break out the drills and air seeders and plant some wheat. As you go out, coffee in hand, lunch (that will end up being more or less ‘brunch’) in your little cooler, you have quite a few factors to be concerned about in regards to soil conditions and making sure your wheat has the best chances of surviving.

The basics of pick-

ing your planting times and how to ensure the best start for your wheat crop revolve around soil temperature, moisture, timing, depth and seeding rates.

Climate

In September we can get a wide variety of weather activities going on. We get some scorching hot and dry days, musty and humid days, chilly days, or sometimes all of the above. With all of this going on, picking the right time to plant is like hitting a moving target. Pair it with the extra whacky weather we have been dealing with, finding a good time to plant will be nothing short of a challenge.

According to Kansas State University’s Agronomy eUpdate from October 7, 2016, the

ideal soil temperature for germination is between 54 and 77 degrees Fahrenheit. Anything hotter than around 90 degrees, seeds might not germinate until soil temperatures reach the right levels for germination. Since planting and the beginning part of the growing process for wheat are a race against time, it is important to get the seed in with enough time for it to begin root development and grow a couple of tillers.

Thankfully, the latest seed innovations have helped reduce the chances of having winter damage to the wheat, so being a tad bit late is not as big of an issue as it once was. Still, despite these advancements, having the right moisture at planting is key to proper germination and a successful wheat crop.

Moisture content

The point when the wheat seed begins to take in water is called imbibing. According to Michigan State

University Extension, soil should have a moisture content of around 35 to 45% in order to supply the seed with enough moisture to imbibe and germinate.

There is some debate and some strategies when it comes to planting so moisture is just right. Some wait for it to rain and then they plant. This way, there is moisture for certain, and you can go for it right away. Unfortunately, there might be some problems with getting equipment in. On the flip side, you can dust it in and hope for rain, but unless you have a tried-and-true rain dance, this is a risky option. Finally, you can plant seeds deeper to reach the moisture zone, but depending on the depth and amount of moisture in that layer, this too might be an issue. The coleoptile might grow to its full potential and still not break through the soil surface.

Timing

Like anything else,

timing is key. During planting, you might hear a lot about the “fly-free date” and the different zones that spread out across the state. The “fly-free date” is when the pesky Hessian fly reaches the adult stage and would be unable to lay eggs in the wheat plant. Although waiting a little bit longer can mean avoiding the Hessian fly or aphids that might spread barley yellow dwarf virus, waiting too long may result in a drop in yield.

There are four zones of ideal planting in Kansas. K-State’s extension wheat specialist Dr. Romulo Lollato has done research and concluded that sowing date plays a major role in crop yields. Planting after recommended dates can mean a whopping decrease in yields of up to 3.5 bushels an acre per day.

Recommended planting dates by zone are listed below.

Zone 1: September 10-30

Zone 2: September

15-October 20

Zone 3: September 25-October 20

Zone 4: October 5-25

Depth

Depth is another factor to consider. Ideal placement would be around one inch deep. This allows enough seed coverage and access to enough moisture. Shallower than about 0.5 inch might leave your seed wide open to the elements. You run the risk of exposing the crown to potential winterkill. However, if you have your wheat planted too deep, generally over 2 inches deep, the wheat’s coleoptile that encases the first true leaf might finish growing before even busting through the soil’s surface.

Seeding Rates

To add another layer of complications, seeding rate is another factor to consider. Seeding rates should be increased if the crop is irrigated or planted later. For every week beyond October 10 in western Kansas, increase seeding by 10 to 15 pounds per acre and in eastern Kansas, 15 to 20 pounds an acre. That being said, there should not be more than 1.35 million seeds per acre. Late seeded wheat can require a 30 to 60% increase in seeding rates. Since the window of opportunity to grow tillers has been decreased, planting more seeds means more primary tillers to compensate.

As planting season begins in some parts of Kansas, choosing the right date to plant is way harder than just putting seeds into the ground. It boils down to having the right climate, moisture and depth. Keep these factors in mind as you plant this season.

When a voter has been registered according to law, his or her registration shall continue to be valid until one of the following occurs:

The voter changes name by marriage, divorce or legal proceedings.

The voter changes residence in which he or she resided at the time he or she registered.

When a voter dies or is disqualified for voting, his or her registration will be pulled from the files. When a voter fails to vote in two consecutive General Elections, such voter’s name may be removed from the registration books and party affiliation lists. Such voter must reregister in order to be able to vote.

CHARTER ORDINANCE NO. 1-2019

A CHARTER ORDINANCE AMENDING CHARTER ORDINANCE NO. 2-2016 OF THE CITY OF SPIVEY, KANSAS, WHEREBY THE TERM OF OFFICE OF NEWLY ELECTED GOVERNING BODY MEMBERS IS AMENDED TO COMMENCE ON THE REGULAR MEETING DATE OF DECEMBER.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF SPIVEY, KANSAS:

Section 1. The City of Spivey, Kansas, by the power vested in it by Article 12, Section 5 of the Kansas Constitution hereby elects to and does exempt itself and make inapplicable to it the provisions of K.S.A. 25-313 that apply to this city, but are parts of enactments which do not apply uniformly to all cities.

Section 2. Section 6 of Charter Ordinance No. 2-2016 shall be amended to read as follows:

“The term of office for newly elected and qualified members of the governing body positions shall commence on the regularly scheduled meeting of the governing body in December following the certification of the November general election. The mayor and council members shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified.”

Section 3. This Charter Ordinance shall be published once each week for two consecutive weeks in the official city newspaper.

Section 4. This Charter Ordinance shall take effect 61 days after the final publication unless a sufficient petition for a referendum is filed, requiring a referendum to be held on the ordinance as provided by Article 12, Section 5, Subsection (c)(3) of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, in which case this charter Ordinance shall become effective upon approval by the majority of the electors voting thereon.

Passed by the Governing Body, not less than two-thirds of the members elect voting in favor thereof, this 20th day of September, 2019.

Celebrations of Life

Dr. Lewis Bloom

WICHITA — Dr. Lewis Theil Bloom, 87, died September 19, 2019, in Wichita. He was born March 1, 1932, at home on a farm northwest of Liberal, to Mildred Catherine (Headrick) and Lewis Alfred Bloom. Theil married Olive Zoe Selfridge on August 23, 1952, at the United Methodist Church in Dighton.

Survivors include his widow, Olive, of the home; three sons, Lamont (Vicki), Wichita; Barry (Alice), Wichita; and Jim (Susan), Longmont, Colorado; 11 grandchildren; and 19 great-grandchildren.

His parents preceded him in death, Lewis on May 22, 1987, and Mildred on May 20, 1988, at Liberal, as well as his only brother, Norman Lee Bloom, December 18, 2015, at Kismet.

Theil was graduated from Liberal High School in 1950; Kansas State University, Manhattan, in 1954; and the University of Kansas School of Medicine, Kansas City, Kansas, in 1957. He practiced family medicine for 10 years as a partner of the Truhart Clinic, in Sterling. During his years there, he attended the delivery of more than 400 babies. He returned to KU School of Medicine in 1968 for a residency in general radiology, finishing in 1971. He joined the Wichita Clinic, where he practiced radiology until 1976. He moved to Kingman in 1976 and Pratt in 1986, providing radiology services to rural hospitals in Kingman, Pratt, Harper, Anthony, and Cherryvale, Kansas, as well as Alva and Woodward, Oklahoma. He retired in 2005, and he and Olive moved to Wichita.

Theil was a board-certified general radiologist, a fellow of American College of Radiology, and a member of the American Medical Association. He was a member of the Kansas State University and University of Kansas Alumni Associations; 4-H and the Kansas Farm Bureau; Calvary United Methodist Church, Wichita; and a Rotarian during his years in Sterling and Pratt.

He and Olive were founding members of the South Central Kansas Community Foundation in Pratt. They also supported the Pratt Regional Medical Center Foundation and together they were active participants in Sunday school classes. Theil said one of his most memorable stints of community service came from team-teaching a middle school Sunday School class at Pratt for two years. Outside of work, which he considered “a reward all its own,” Theil enjoyed flying, boating, and water skiing.

Memorials to the Dr. Theil Bloom Memorial Fund at the South Central Kansas Community Foundation, Pratt, to provide scholarships for future healthcare providers and administrators from central and western Kansas; Calvary United Methodist Church, Wichita; or the Great Plains United Methodist Camp Lakeside, Scott City.

Funeral was Monday, at Calvary United Methodist Church, 2525 N Rock Road, with burial at Reflection Pointe Cemetery.
