April 29, 2019
The Cunningham City Council met Monday, April 29, 2019 at City Hall, 119 N. Main.
Present were Council Members Jason Ruckle, Karl Vierthaler, Matt Westerhaus, and Tim Schultz; City Attorney Greg Graffman; City Superintendent Tim Strickland, and City Clerk David Steffen.
Guests: Jackie Ruckle, Jamie Elliott
President of the Council Ruckle called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.
Agenda – Motion by Vierthaler, second by Schultz, to approve the agenda as written. Motion carried, 4/0.
Minutes – Motion by Westerhaus, second by Vierthaler, to approve the minutes of the March 25, 2019 meeting as written. Motion carried, 4/0.
Public Comments –
Welcome to Cunningham Sign – Jackie Ruckle showed the Council a drawing of the “Welcome to Cunningham” sign the local PRIDE committee is planning to place near the northeast corner of the intersection of Leiter and Valley.
Motion by Vierthaler, second by Schultz, to approve the sign and authorize electrical service to light it. Motion carried, 4/0.
Property Officer Position –
Executive Session - Motion by Ruckle, second by Vierthaler, that the City Council recess into executive session with members of the City Council, City Attorney, City Clerk, and Jackie Ruckle to discuss non-elected per-

sonnel, specifically the City Property Officer position, the justification of the motion being the non-elected personnel matter exemption K.S.A. 75-4319(b) (1), with the meeting to resume in this room in City Hall in ten (10) minutes. Motion carried, 4/0.
The above met in executive session from 6:37 p.m. to 6:47 p.m. at which time open session resumed and Mr. Ruckle stated that no action had been taken during the executive session.
Motion by Vierthaler, second by Westerhaus, to recommend Mayor Murphy appoint Jackie Ruckle to the position of Property Officer for the City of Cunningham. Motion carried, 4/0.
Fire Department – Jamie Elliott gave the Fire Department report. There were two runs in the past month. One was a mutual aid call in Reno County. The second was a structure fire on east First in Cunningham. Elliott stated that the new fire truck should be painted this weekend. Some fittings and valves will need to be installed. CDS in Pratt will wire the truck for radios. The Kingman County Sheriff donated emergency lights and a siren for the truck.
ORDINANCE NO. 671 - AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 15-221 OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF CUNNINGHAM, KANSAS, CONCERNING RATES FOR WATER USE IN THE CITY OF CUNNINGHAM, KANSAS. Motion by Westerhaus, second by Vierthaler, to approve Ordinance No. 671. Motion carried, 4/0.
ORDINANCE NO. 672 - AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 15-413(c) OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF CUNNINGHAM, KANSAS,

CONCERNING SEWER SERVICE CHARGES IN THE CITY OF CUNNINGHAM, KANSAS. Motion by Westerhaus, second by Schultz, to approve Ordinance No. 672. Motion carried, 4/0.
City Insurance Policy – The Council reviewed the City’s insurance policy with EMC Insurance through Strong’s Insurance.
Football Field Bleachers – The Council discussed the lumber on the concrete football field bleachers with treated lumber. Consensus of the Council was to dispose of the metal covering as the City Superintendent sees fit. Discussion was held regarding setting up a work day in July or August. Motion by Westerhaus, second by Vierthaler, to proceed with the park bleacher rebuilding project.
Request to temporarily close street, N 150 ft of 400 block of N. Lincoln, May 10 – Motion by Ruckle, second by Westerhaus, to grant Aaron Murphy’s request to temporarily close the north 150 feet of Lincoln Street on Friday, May 10, with the closure not to exceed midnight. Motion carried, 4/0.
Crack Sealing First Street – Motion by Schultz, second by Vierthaler, to accept a proposal (attached to minutes) from South Central Sealing Co., Wichita, to seal cracks on First Street from the west city limit to the east city limit. Motion carried, 4/0.
Sewer Root Control – Motion by Westerhaus, second by Ruckle, to accept a proposal from Duke’s Root Control, to treat city sewer mains for roots, with the cost not to exceed \$5,000.00. Motion carried, 4/0.
Executive Session - Motion by

Ruckle, second by Vierthaler, that the City Council recess into executive session with members of the City Council, City Attorney, City Superintendent, and City Clerk to discuss non-elected personnel, the justification of the motion being the non-elected personnel matter exemption K.S.A. 75-4319(b)(1), with the meeting to resume in this room in City Hall in five (5) minutes. Motion carried, 5/0.
The above met in executive session from 7:43 p.m. to 7:48 p.m. at which time open session resumed and Mayor Murphy stated that no action had been taken during the executive session.
Maintenance Report – Tim Strickland gave the maintenance report. Spring Clean-Up is going well. Harbert Sand has delivered ten loads of sand for city streets. Maintenance is picking up limbs left curbside by residents.
Swimming Pool - Molly Morgan visited with the Council regarding painting. Weather permitting, the German Exchange group could paint this coming Wednesday or Sunday. There are some personnel changes at the pool. The Council will take action on personnel at the next meeting.
Financial Report and Payment of Bills - Steffen presented the financial report and reviewed the month’s bills with the governing body. Motion by Westerhaus, second by Schultz, to approve the financial report, including transfers, and pay the bills as presented. Motion carried, 4/0.
Adjournment – Motion by Ruckle, second by Vierthaler, to adjourn. Motion carried, 4/0. Mr. Ruckle adjourned the meeting at 8:28 p.m.

YEARS AGO IN

May 29, 1969 – Volunteer help is needed at the former Hauser building being converted to a youth recreation center, according to Chairman Ivan Cain. The group works every evening except Wednesday and Sunday.

Three new councilmen were sworn in; four re-appointments made to city offices, and one new appointment made at the regular meeting of the Cunningham City Council in the City Hall, Monday evening.

The three new councilmen elected at the April 1 City Election, are Marion Lackey, Joe Rohling, and George Urban. Re-elected to his fifth two-year term as Mayor is Francis Dafforn, and re-elected councilmen are Ivan Cain and Floren (Shorty) Rose.

The City Council made four re-appointments to city offices: Jack Meyers, Clerk; Dean Mantooth, Treasurer; G. L. Hergert, Marshal; and Floren Rose, Fire Chief; and one new appointment, Mary McClellan, Police Judge.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Thimesch announce the birth of a son, Tuesday, May 20, at the Donley Hospital in Kingman. He weighed nine pounds, 10 ounces, and has been named Mark Alan.

May 28, 1964 – The big red brick building formerly the Ratcliff Hotel and now owned by George Ellis of Wichita, failed to sell at public auction a week ago last Wednesday. Hutchinson auctioneer Charlie Davenport opened the bidding at \$20,000, but was still looking for a bidder with the price asked dropped to \$5,000.

Baseball practice will be held at the ball field, Friday evening, May 29, at 5:00 o'clock, for boys in the 11, 12, and 13-year-old age group. Besides their usual equipment of bats, gloves, and balls, the boys are requested to bring their garden rakes, hoes, and their dads.

Mary Belle Thomas, 76, a resident of Cunningham all her life, passed away last Friday evening.

Mrs. Thomas was born August 27, 1887, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Simonson. She was married to Charles Ora Franks at Cunningham, January 28, 1909.

To this union were born six daughters, two of whom preceded her in death. Mr. Franks passed away in 1939.

May 28, 1959 – Jack Baber, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Baber, will become Cunningham's first Eagle Scout at a Boy Scout Court of Honor in the Lodge Hall next Monday night, June 1, at 8:00 o'clock.

In receiving Scouting's highest award, Jack has spent the past seven years, since 1952, going up through Scouting's regular advancements, Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life, and now an Eagle Scout. He has 21 merit badges.

A safe was "cracked" in broad daylight in Cunningham, Tuesday.

Vic Rohling, new owner of the former Cannon Variety Store, had never had occasion to use the office safe at the store. The late Mr. Cannon left the safe on the last number of the original combination, opening it with the handle and never locking the safe. Mr. Rohling inadvertently turned the combination lock the other day, locking the safe, and couldn't locate the safe combination. Professional "safe crackers" were called to the scene, drilled through the safe, and opened it. Their charge was \$60.00, and Mr. Rohling says burglars couldn't have gotten that much.

May 27, 1954 – The Vacation Bible School sponsored jointly by the Methodist and Christian Churches of this city, opened Monday with an enrollment of 73 youngsters.

Rain forced the postponement of the community-wide picnic originally scheduled for Tuesday evening of this week. The event will be held next Tuesday evening at Cooley's Grove, starting at five o'clock.

This is the first issue of the Clipper printed from our new building in Cunningham. The paper is a day late but we had so much work to do during and after the moving operation that it couldn't be helped. Raney's Truck Service handled the moving of the heavy machinery in fine shape. Carl Buntemeyer got the building and equipment wired in efficient fashion, and the machinery all in place and adjusted for printing. You are cordially invited to visit us in our new home. We are very proud of the new building, built by local contractor Delmar Huffman, and we think he did an excellent job.

Honor students at Cunningham Grade School this year were Marta Creamer, Chester Fee, Betty Manahan, Audrey Nossaman, Dorothy McGeorge, Grimes Pearson, Russell Stanley, Helen Steffen, and Florence Stillwell.

May 25, 1934 – The members of Sacred Heart Parish of this city and community will dedicate their new church building at special services on Memorial Day. Bishop August Schwertner of the Wichita Diocese, Father John Butler of Ford, and Father Leo Debes of LaCrosse, former pastor of this parish, will be present and take part in the dedication ceremony.

The Western Light & Power Company held an Electric Cooking School in the Ratcliff Building, Wednesday afternoon. Quite a number of ladies attended the school and enjoyed the demonstrations of cooking by electricity.

Cairo news: Harry Smith had seven hundred tomato plants killed by Paris Green spray. Mr. Smith wanted to kill the potato bugs, but the spray was liberal and killed both.

Mike Garrett, Horizons Mental Health Director was in with a statement of Revenue and Expenses for the County Commissioners to review that ended April 30, 2019.

Mr. Garrett submitted a copy of Horizons Mental Health’s preliminary budget for 2020 and when the budget has been finalized he

will get a copy to the Commissioners.

Mendy Frampton, Kingman Expo Center Executive Director was in to request purchasing armless chairs from National Business Furniture in the amount of \$1,171.80. The Commissioners would like for Ms. Frampton to look at other companies.

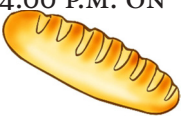
