City Council Met on October 28th

The Cunningham City Council met in regular session on Monday, October 28, 2019 at City Hall, 119 N. Main. Present were Mayor Aaron Murphy, Council Members Bart Ricke, Jason Ruckle, Tim Schultz, Karl Vierthaler, and Matt Westerhaus; City Attorney Greg Graffman; City Superintendent Russell Rohlman; and City Clerk David Steffen.

Guests included Jamie Elliott, Assistant Fire Chief; Jackie Ruckle, Property Officer; and Lucas Baldwin.

Mayor Murphy called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

The Council approved the evening's agenda as written and approved the minutes of the September 30, 2019 regular meeting as written.

Public Comments – Lucas Baldwin visited with the Council about his plan to bring his racing (homing) pigeons to town. As pigeons are not defined as "fowl" they would not be prohibited by the City Code. Mr. Baldwin stated that most of the time the birds would be in their coop and did not anticipate problems.

Fire Department – Jamie Elliott gave the Fire Department report. Truck No. 332 is in service, lacking only signage. Chief Stark took the truck to Emergency Fire Equipment in Mayfield, KS for installation of the monitor, which makes the truck a one-person vehicle if necessary. Stark also took the truck to the school for this year's Fire Safety

program.

Property Officer report – Jackie Ruckle reported that seven of the vehicles cited in the past month as inoperative were either removed from town or property tagged. The Council approved a request from a resident for more time to remove vehicles, giving him until the end of October. Jackie stated that she would help city maintenance with removal of piles of tree limbs around town to clean up areas not cleared during the Fall Clean Up.

Water Well No. 3 – Mayor Murphy gave the Council an update on the status of the water well project. He is in contact with KDHE in Topeka. KDHE received a set of updated plans from Harlan Foraker, Certified Engineering Design, on October 23 and will be reviewing them this week.

Fowl – Members of the Council discussed the city code regarding the keeping of chickens within the city limits. The Council approved a motion for the City Attorney to write a clear definition of the word "fowl" to include the word "chicken" by a 4/1 vote. Yes: Ruckle, Vierthaler, Ricke, and Schultz. No: Westerhaus.

A resident on South Douglas requested the Council reduce his water bill to an amount equal to his normal usage after repairing a leak in a line to an outside hydrant. The Council approved the request.

Executive Session – Motion by

Ruckle, second by Vierthaler, for the governing body to meet in executive session for five minutes with the City Attorney and City Clerk to discuss an individual employee's performance with the justification being K.S.A. 75-4319(b)(1), the non-elected personnel matter exception, with the meeting to resume in open session in the meeting room of City Hall. Motion carried, 5/0.

The above met in executive session from 6:59 to 7:04 p.m., at which time the meeting resumed in open session and Mayor Murphy stated that no action had been taken during the executive session.

Executive Session – Motion by Ruckle, second by Vierthaler, for the governing body to meet in executive session for ten minutes with the City Attorney, City Clerk and City Superintendent to discuss an individual employee's performance with the justification being K.S.A. 75-4319(b)(1), the non-elected personnel matter exception, with the meeting to resume in open session in the meeting room of City Hall. Motion carried, 5/0.

The above met in executive session from 7:05 to 7:15 p.m. Mr. Rohlman left the executive session at 7:12 p.m. At 7:15 p.m. the meeting resumed in open session and Mayor Murphy stated that no action had been taken during the executive session.

November meeting date – The Council approved a motion to hold a special meeting of the City Council at

3:30 p.m., Friday, November 22, 2019 at City Hall. The purpose of the special meeting is to replace the Council's regular meeting scheduled for Monday, November 25, 2019, which will not be held. .

Maintenance Report – Russ Rohlman gave the maintenance report.

Fall Clean-up is finished. Three 40 cu. yd dumpsters were filled with debris and trash. One 30 cu. yd. dumpster was filled with scrap metal and appliances.

Streets were discussed. Loaded grain trucks are damaging the 100 block of S. Elliott. Consensus of the Council was to replace the signs prohibiting truck traffic on Elliott and Main Streets. Loaded trucks should use Valley Street and access the grain elevator using Santa Fe.

Rohlman has finished sweeping streets. The park restrooms have been winterized and closed for the season. The concession stand and pool house have also been winterized.

Trees – The Council discussed the need to trim trees on Main Street as low hanging branches are a traffic hazard.

Financial Report and Payment of Bills – The Council reviewed the month's bills and financial report. The Council approved the financial report, including transfers, and paid the bills as presented.

Following approval of a motion to adjourn, Mayor Murphy adjourned the meeting 7:52 p.m.

.... And on November 22

The Cunningham City Council met in special session at 3:30 p.m. on Friday, November 22, 2019 at City Hall, 119 N. Main. Notice of the special meeting was published in the Cunningham Courier and posted at several locations downtown.

Present were Council Members Bart Ricke, Jason Ruckle, and Karl Vierthaler; City Attorney Greg Graffman; City Superintendent Russell Rohlman; and City Clerk David Steffen. Councilman Matt Westerhaus arrived at 4:20 p.m.

Guests included Harold Stark, Fire Chief; Jackie Ruckle, Property Officer; and Randy Shelman, City Maintenance.

President of the Council Ruckle the meeting to order at 3:30 p.m.

The Council approved the evening's agenda with no additions and approved the minutes of the October 28, 2019 regular meeting as written.

Public Comments & Communications – A letter was read by the Council from two Kingman residents complimenting the city's swimming pool, lifeguards, and pool manager Molly Morgan.

A letter was received from Nisly Brothers, Inc., a notice of intent to increase rates in Cunningham effective January 1, 2020. The increase for a resident with one cart would increase 20¢ from the current \$27.50 per month to \$27.70. Other rates will also increase 20¢. The increase is tied to an increase in landfill charges.

Fire Department – Harold Stark gave the Fire Department report. The department has changed from one meeting per month to two per month. Each fire truck

is assigned to different firefighters on a rotating schedule for monthly maintenance checks.

Harold has participated in two tabletop incident command exercises set up by Kingman Emergency Management.

Brush truck No. 324 has been brought to town for maintenance. Chief Stark and the Council discussed putting the skid with the fire fighting equipment on a newer chassis.

Harold has written a letter of appreciation to Cheri and Heath Dorzweiler for making and donating the sign for the fire station.

The annual fire runs and meeting report was reviewed by the Council. There were seven fire runs and fourteen meetings in the period between November 24, 2018 and November 21, 2019. The Council approved the report and payment to the volunteer firefighters totaling \$2,640.00.

Fowl – The City Attorney informed the Council that the City Code has a section that includes a definition of the word "fowl" as it applies to the Code (2-101, which reads: "FOWL. All animals that are included in the zoological class aves, which shall include, but not limited to, chickens, ducks, geese, turkeys, guineas, and pigeons."). Therefore, no new ordinance is needed (as requested by the Council at the October meeting) since "fowl" includes "chickens" in the code.

Water Well No. 3 – The City received a letter dated November 4, 2019 from KDHE that the PWS Well #3, Waterline and Sodium Hypochlorite

Storage Building Improvements project has been approved and that the City of Cunningham is authorized to advertise for bids. Harlan Foraker, Certified Engineering Design (CED), is working on the advertisement for bids. Bids are to be received by 11:00 a.m., December 20, 2019 at City Hall, 119 N. Main in Cunningham.

Property Officer report – Jackie Ruckle reported that she had designed a door hanger to use in contacting owners and/or tenants of properties not in compliance with City Code. Consensus of the Council was for Jackie to have Taylor Printing make the door hangers. Several properties and vehicles were discussed for possible action by the property officer.

Executive Session – Motion by Ruckle, second by Vierthaler, for the governing body to meet in executive session for five minutes with the City Attorney and City Clerk to discuss an individual employee's performance with the justification being K.S.A. 75-4319(b)(1), the non-elected personnel matter exception, with the meeting to resume in open session in the meeting room of City Hall. Motion carried, 3/0.

The above met in executive session from 3:57 to 4:02 p.m., at which time the meeting resumed in open session and Mr. Ruckle stated that no action had been taken during the executive session.

Executive Session – Motion by Ruckle, second by Vierthaler, for the governing body to meet in executive session for five minutes with the City Attorney, City Clerk and City

Superintendent to discuss an individual employee's performance with the justification being K.S.A. 75-4319(b)(1), the non-elected personnel matter exception, with the meeting to resume in open session in the meeting room of City Hall. Motion carried, 3/0.

The above met in executive session from 4:03 to 4:08 p.m., at which time the meeting resumed in open session and Mr. Ruckle stated that no action had been taken during the executive session.

The City Attorney left the meeting at 4:10 p.m.

Maintenance Report – Russ Rohlman gave the maintenance report. Rohlman and Shelman attended a KRWA water workshop in Wellington on November 21. The Stenner pumps used by the City for chlorination of the water were discussed in detail with information on maintenance and repair of the pumps included. Maintenance is checking the buildings winterized in the park regularly. The swimming pool was discussed, including using city maintenance personnel to power-wash and paint the pool this spring.

Council member Matt Westerhaus arrived at 4:20 p.m.

The Council reviewed the month's bills and financial report approved a motion to approve the financial report, including transfers, and pay the bills as presented.

Following approval of a motion to adjourn, Mr. Ruckle adjourned the meeting at 4:38 p.m.

– Plans are “shaping up” for the big welcome to be accorded Santa Claus when he comes to Cunningham, Saturday afternoon, Dec. 14, according to Dean Cooley, General Chairman.

The Cunningham Wildcats won their first basketball game of the season at Alden last Friday night, trimming the Tigers, 47 to 42.

John McCune paced the Cunningham scoring attack with 20 points, 10 of them from the free throw line.

The Nashville-Zenda Thunderbirds broke into the win column last Friday night, thumping the Sharon Cardinals, 67 to 60, in a Golden Plains League game played at Zenda.

Steve Adelhardt led the N-Z scoring attack with 28 points.

Bells will ring from the United Methodist Church this Sunday. The bells, a gift to the church and community by Mrs. Ferd Burnett, are a memorial to her respected husband, the late Dr. Ferd Burnett, who game many years of his life to the Cunningham community as a physician.

Workmen installed the bells Wednesday.

The Cunningham Post Office will be open all day Saturday for the convenience of Christmas mailers, according to Postmaster Evan Thornhill.

The City of Cunningham water tower is attractively lighted this year at Christmas-time with red and blue lights representing a huge Christmas bell in the sky.

The tower lights were installed by Harry DeArmond and Don Becker.

Roy Ellis, 57, a resident of Cunningham for 36 years, died Monday west of Garden City from an apparent heart attack while driving his truck.

December 11, 1953
– Mr. and Mrs. Roy Halderson of Glasco, announce the birth of a son, Saturday, December 5, at the Concordia Hospital. The baby weighed six pounds, thirteen ounces, and has been named Kevin Roy.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Wetherall of Cunningham, are the maternal grandparents.

The Cunningham Wildcats lost a thrilling over-time basketball game to Plevna High School last Friday night on the Plevna court. The final score was 59 to 57, and the regular game ended with the score tied at 55-all.

Cunningham’s center, Ronnie Adelhardt, used his six-foot, seven-inch height to good advantage and scored twenty-five points for high scoring honors in the game. Billy DeWeese scored twenty-one points.

December 18, 1953
– The Cunningham Wildcats pulled the game out of the lost column in

the last two minutes of their game with Hazelton High School last Friday night in the local gymnasium, winning by a score of 69 to 65. The Wildcats were behind 65-60 with about two minutes to play, but came up with four field goals and one free shot in the final 120 seconds while holding Hazelton scoreless.

Victor Becker scored 25 points to lead the Wildcat scoring attack. Ronnie Adelhardt made 21, Billy DeWeese made 13, and Wally Becker counted 10 points to complete the Cunningham scoring.

The Santa Claus Day Committee ordered a nice day, a large crowd, Santa Claus, and a big parade, and they got what they wanted last Saturday as the people of Cunningham and the surrounding community enjoyed one of the best Santa Claus Day celebrations. After watching one of the largest parades in the town’s history, Santa Claus and his helpers distributed about nine hundred treat to children and then the kids were treated to a free show at the Cunningham Theatre. The success of this year’s Santa Claus Day belongs to the Cunningham business men, the Community Men’s Club, the churches, the schools, and the many individuals who gave their time that the day might be an enjoyable one – which indeed it was.

December 10, 1948
– Bids on the new grade school building were opened Wednesday and were found to be about twenty-five thousand dollars greater than the funds available for the project. A new bond issue of twenty-five thousand dollars will be necessary if the Board of Education sticks by its set of original plans for the new building. Last month patrons of the grade school district voted one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars in bonds for a new building.

Cunningham defeated Nashville in a basketball game played at Nashville Friday night by the score of 41 to 31. Bobby Urban and Jack Watkins paced the Wildcat scoring attack with 12 points each.

Mr. John Kaster opened his law office in Cunningham this week. Mr. Kaster married a former Cunningham girl, Emma Jane Baber, and has previously practiced law in Topeka. He was released from active duty with the United

States Army in 1947, after attaining the rank of Colonel in the Army’s legal department.

December 17, 1948 – For the second time last week, the Lighthouse station at Cairo was the victim of robbers.

Thursday evening the station, owned by W. S. (Pat) Grier, was broken into and five tires and a quantity of candy stolen. Theives entered by breaking the glass in a door, then reaching in and unbolting it.

A week ago Monday night, the station was entered and merchandise to the value of approximately \$50.00 was taken.

A passerby reported a green Plymouth with an out-of-state license tag on it standing near the station about the time of the Monday night robbery.

The high school basketball team lost both games to Isabel High School last Friday night. The first team dropped their game by a 29-27 score, and the second team lost by a 27-22 score.

December 1943 –

Publication is suspended for the duration of the war.

December 9, 1938 – Students of both the grade and high schools are receiving free musical instrument instruction through the federal government’s WPA agency. Mrs. Carl Schwake of Kingman, is the instructor.

The Wildcatters won their first game of the current basketball season from Turon High School last Friday night by a score of 13 to 5. Only half of the game was played at Turon because of an electric power failure which ended the game at half-time.

December 16, 1938 – Mr. George Miles of Wichita, eldest brother of Mr. Frank Miles of Cunningham, passed away last Saturday. Forty years ago Mr. Miles lived thirteen miles east of Kingman and helped build the little Baptist Church that still stands by Highway 54.

Miss Rubie Sheldon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Sheldon of

Cunningham, and a senior at Southwestern College in Winfield, won first prize with her poem, “Desert Song,” in the 1938 Southwest Poetry Contest.

December 8, 1933 – Mr. Wiley Doty suffered a very painful and serious accident, Tuesday morning, when he fell from a load of hay at the Jane Morton farm, breaking both arms just above the wrists.

December 15, 1933 – Ford Motor Company’s new 1934 model automobile is on display at the Dafforn Motor Company.

The framework of the new Sacred Heart Church has been erected and work is progressing rapidly on the structure. Martin Pelzl is the contractor and most of the work is being done by men members of the Cunningham parish.

December 14, 1928 – Mr. Fred Ball is busy this week moving his cream station into the new building erected by the Fairmont Creamery Company. The former building was destroyed by fire about two months ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Carde

Cannon are driving a new Model A Ford purchased last week from the Dafforn Motor Company in Zenda.

A number of business men and farmers are meeting in the High School Auditorium each Monday night and playing a few games of volley ball.

The Cunningham Lady Wildcats seemed in mid-season form as the 2019-20 season got underway, but as their coach I know better. We aren't fully greased and synchronized by any means. We were able to hit the ground running in large part because we are, by now, a veteran team and we faced an opponent that is on the young side, and there is no substitute for experience. But in fairness to Minneola, we threw the kitchen sink at them in terms of half court and full court defense and adjusting often which kept them off balance. I wanted to

test my players' retention of the various alignments and responsibilities tied to each defense and I would give them a passing grade. We were not able to work on much variation when on offense due to the 3-2 defense Minneola employed most of the night. I could have forced them to play man-to-man but didn't see the need. Cunningham raced to a 17-6 first quarter lead and the comfortable lead swelled to 28 points by halftime, 36-8. We pride ourselves on defense so it's the number 8 that impresses me more than the 36! I asked the girls to give me a "40-20-15-10" game (FG% - rebounds - steals - turn-

overs). What they gave me was a 41-25-25-7 game. Apparently, I set the bar too low. I'm most proud of the turnover number for the first game of the year. As a team, our 41% field goal percentage was produced by 26 makes in 63 attempts, but 6 of the made shots were from behind the arc. Effectively, our field goal percentage was 46%.

Morgan Meyers was on target, scoring 18 at halftime on her way to 27 points, a career high. Two others nearly cracked double digits as Alayna McGuire and Mackenzie Wright tallied 9 points apiece. Madie McGuire netted 7 points on 3 of 4 shooting while the balance of our scoring came from Holly Deweese (6), Maddi Panek (4), Abby Hansen (2), and Reese

McGuire (2).

Mackenzie and Holly each grabbed 8 rebounds to pace our team output and Maddi Panek was on their heels with 7 rebounds of her own. Mackenzie was in the thieving mood with 6 steals while Morgan had 5. Finally, it was Alayna easily outdistancing the others in the assist category with 6.

A better start to the season would be hard to imagine, but much work lies ahead. We play in a tournament at Skyline next week with games against Wichita Prep Academy, Medicine Lodge, and Skyline. Be assured, we won't overlook anyone.

Kansas Profile – Now That’s Rural

Chris Broeckelman, Natoma woodworking

“If you can dream it, you can do it.” That inspirational slogan might describe the work of Chris Broeckelman and his industrial technology students at Natoma High School. They are using their classes to develop skills, not just in the shop, but in life. It’s today’s Kansas Profile.

Chris Broeckelman is the industrial technology instructor at Natoma High School in northwest Kansas. Chris grew up on a farm near Selden, one of eight children of Joe and Cathy Broeckelman.

“I always had an interest in carpentry,” Chris said. During high school, he worked at the local lumberyard. “I had a high school woodworking teacher that I thought very highly of.”

Chris studied Technology Studies and Secondary Education at Fort Hays State with a minor in business. He also worked at a cabinet shop. After graduation, he took the teaching position at Natoma. He married Megan. They now have six children.

“When I was five or six years old, I said I wanted to be a carpenter or a vegetable farmer when I grew up,” Chris

said. “Now I’m teaching woodworking and have a big garden, so I’m about there.”

His industrial technology program begins with basic mechanical drafting, autocad, and woodworking classes during junior high. At the high school level, the elective classes in computer aided design and woodworking become progressively more challenging each year.

The woodworking program begins with wood processing where students learn about milling methods, identifying trees, and different drying processes. It progresses to the students imagining, designing and building a project of their own. Safety is the top emphasis throughout.

The wood is sourced locally. Farmers or power companies often donate logs which the students can cut. This year, windstorms uprooted several trees. “Ninety percent of our wood comes from salvage,” Chris said. “We resell the wood at cost to the students, which saves parents and kids thousands of dollars and supports the program.” Walnut, hackberry and white oak are popular.

The state technology competition is a motivational tool for Chris’s students. For more than 50 years, Fort Hays State University has conducted a Western Kansas Technology Fair competition open to any school in the state. Outside judges evaluate the quality of the entries. There are competitions in drafting, graphic communications, power, energy and transportation systems,

plus production systems, including metalwork and woodwork, which is the largest category.

Participants receive white, red, or blue ribbons depending on the quality of the work. Superior products can be awarded a gold rosette. “It takes a lot of work to get that,” Chris said. “The kids make a big deal of it.”

More than 300 projects were entered last year. “Eleven of my 19 high school students brought home rosettes,” Chris said. Among Chris’s students, a sixth grader, eighth grader and freshman won best in class overall. Natoma has consistently been a top winner.

That’s a remarkable record for students from a school in a rural community such as Natoma, population 335 people. Now, that’s rural.

What products do students build? “The sky’s the limit,” Chris said. “I tell them, ‘If you can dream it up, we’ll find a way to build it.’ And they challenge me.” Projects typically include bedroom sets, dressers, dining room tables, coffee tables, and many more.

“Quality is our goal,” Chris said. “I tell them that they’re building a project that their grandkids can fight over after they’re gone.”

Not only are they building a project that will last, they are learning life skills. “To see a kid who starts with no confidence and see them grow is huge,” Chris said. “It’s about having a challenge and overcoming it, problem-solving and learning to work with others. It’s more than just

wood-working, we’re teaching life.”

“If you can dream it, you can do it.” This teacher and his students are making that motto reality. We salute Chris Broeckelman and his students at Natoma High for making a difference with their creativity and skill. When a young student earns that rosette at the state competition, it can be like a dream come true.
