City Council Met in November and December

The Cunningham City Council ended 2018 with three special meetings in November and December.

The governing body met in special session at City Hall, 119 N. Main Street, at 6:30 p.m., Wednesday, November 14. The Council reviewed the Loan Agreement between the KDHE and the City regarding KPWSLF Project 2929 (Water Well No. 3), approving a motion to accept the loan agreement and authorizing Mayor Murphy to sign the agreement on the City’s behalf. The Council approved Ordinance No. 665, authorizing the execution of the loan agreement for the purpose of financing a public water supply project. The ordinance was published in The Cunningham Courier on Thursday, November 22, 2018.

The Cunningham City Council met at 6:30 p.m., Wednesday, November 28, 2018 at City Hall, 119 N. Main. This special session was called due to the cancellation of the regular monthly meeting on Monday, November 26 due to the absence of the Clerk.

At this meeting, Assistant Fire Chief Jamie Elliott gave the fire department report, which included discussion of the ISO inspection the previous week. Also discussed were the department’s plans for equipment upgrades, as well as repairs to the fire station. A list of fire runs & meetings was submitted by the clerk for Council consideration. The Council approved a motion au-

thorizing payment to the volunteer fire fighters for the 2018 runs and meetings as listed in the amount of \$3790.00.

The Council discussed options for Santa Fe Street and approved a motion to accept a proposal from T&R Excavating LLC to rip the existing street from Douglas to Elliott streets, grade road up to put crown in center, haul 200 ton sandy gravel to cap road, and finish grade the gravel surface.

An inspection of the City’s brush and tree disposal site by KDHE resulted in no violations. The following week, the City Superintendent observed a large quantity of plastic trash bags containing yard debris in the burn pit, which would have been a violation of the site’s permit had the plastic been present at the time of inspection. Mr. Strickland emptied the bags and disposed of the plastic in the city dumpster. Consensus of the Council was approval of making access to the site more restrictive by changing the padlock at the gate and authorizing Tim to control access to the key, monitor loads going to the burn site, and other measures he considers necessary to ensure the site’s compliance with the KDHE permit.

The Council approved a motion to cancel the regular meeting set for December 31, 2018, and to schedule a special meeting in its place at 6:30 p.m., December 26, 2018 at City Hall.

At the December 26th meeting, the

Council met at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall.

The Council approved a motion to renew the Cereal Malt Beverage license for Love’s Country Store #695, 445 E. Leiter Ave.

Also approved were Mayor Murphy’s reappointments of Jack Crick and Connie Panek to each serve a three-year term on the Cunningham City Planning Commission and Board of Zoning Appeals.

A resident’s concerns regarding drainage on east Third Street were discussed with City Superintendent.

Fire Chief Harold Stark gave the Fire Department report. The Fire Department has received a Stewart-Stevenson 6x6 military truck to convert into a fire truck. A copy of the agreement with Kansas Forestry Service was given to the City Attorney at the meeting. The truck itself will belong to the department after a two-year period. The truck must be repainted within six months and carried a couple of other stipulations. Plans are to put a 1,000 gallon water tank and other equipment on a skid secured to the bed of the truck. The department has a new hose reel and a pump obtained through a Kansas Forestry Service matching grant last year. Chief Stark estimated the total cost of converting the truck would amount to \$10,000 to \$15,000.

The Council approved a motion to accept the truck from Kansas Forestry Service. The Council approved another motion authorizing the Fire Chief to spend up to \$15,000.00 to convert the truck for Fire Department use.

Water Well No. 3 – The project is

in the hands of the engineer. After the final design is approved by KDHE, the City should be able to seek bids and drill the well.

The Council approved renewing the City’s membership in the League of Kansas Municipalities for 2019.

Also approved was a motion for the City to donate \$150.00 to Cunningham PRIDE for the annual Christmas Lighting Contest.

Members of the Council, the Mayor, and City Attorney met in executive session for ten minutes for the purpose of discussing an employee evaluation.

The Council approved a motion authorizing a \$0.25 per hour cost-of-living pay raise for David Steffen.

Maintenance – Tim Strickland gave the maintenance report. 1) Snow fence is in place north of Fourth Street near Valley and North of Fifth Street west of the school grounds. 2) A manhole was repaired during the grading of Santa Fe St.

Steffen reported that results from the December water tests came back A-OK.

The next regular meeting of the city planning commission will be at 7:00 p.m., Thursday, January 10, 2019 at City Hall.

Steffen presented the financial report and reviewed the month’s bills with the governing body. The Council approved the financial report, including transfers, and paid the bills as presented.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:45 p.m.

Lawrence, Saturday.

Cunningham Masonic
Lodge No. 427 is host-
ing a District Meeting
in the Lodge Hall today
(Thursday), under the
supervision and instruc-
tion of Lee DeWeese of
Cunningham, District
Deputy Grand Master.

The district is com-
prised of Masonic Lodges
from Norwich, Zenda,
Spivey, Kingman, and
Cunningham.

A 6:00 banquet
will be served in the
Christian Church under-
croft by members of the
Cunningham Eastern Star
Chapter.

The Cunningham
Wildcats won their fourth
straight Golden Plains
League game last Friday
night at Hardtner, edging
the Tornadoes, 57 to 55.

John McCune paced
the Wildcat scoring with
22 points.

Over 200 persons,
including several from
Cunningham, attended a
seven-county area meet-
ing of the newly-created
Resource Conservation
and Development
(RC&D) Organization
in Kingman a week ago
Tuesday evening.

The formation of the
RC&D organization em-
bracing seven counties in
south central Kansas is
the first such group to or-
ganize in Kansas but not
in the nation. Purpose for
the organization is to help
small-urban rural areas
develop their full poten-
tial in joining togeth-
er in large multi-county

groups, the strength of
one segment strengthens
the whole area and the
problems of one area be-
come the concern of all.

The RC&D move-
ment got started in Harper
County, with surrounding
counties invited to join in.
Kingman County was one
of the last counties to join
the group.

Committee members
of the Kingman County
segment will present a
program of information at
the next regular meeting
of the Cunningham Lions
Club, Monday evening,
Jan. 20, at Mary's Hi-Way
Café.

January 16, 1964 –
The Kingman County
School Planning Board
will hold five meetings
throughout the county
during the next two weeks.
These meetings are being
held by the board in an at-
tempt to give the people
of Kingman County a
little clearer picture of
the state school unifica-
tion law under which the
board is operating, and
on the individual school
districts throughout the
county. The board also
expects to get information
and opinions from those
present at these meetings
in regard to the desires of
the people on the unifica-
tion matter.

Members of the coun-
ty planning board are
Joe Strong of Nashville
(chairman), Otis Koon of
Norwich, Evan Thornhill
of Cunningham, and Bill
Klaver, Karl Koch, and
Dr. George Wallace, all
of Kingman.

Sixty-one of 91 high
school students had per-
fect attendance records
for the second six-weeks
period of the current
school year, with 41 stu-
dents maintaining perfect
attendance for full 12
weeks.

The high school bas-
keteers scored their sec-
ond straight win and third
victory of the current sea-
son here last Friday night
with a 75 to 41 romp over
Arlington.

Four Cunningham
players got into double
figures in the Wildcat
scoring attack, with Jim
Cain leading the quartet
with 18 points, Kenny
Kerschen and Elmer
Adelhardt each chipped
in 14 points, and Gerald
Schnittker came up with
12.

The Cunningham Fire
Department made a run to
the rear of Dan's Standard
Service, Tuesday after-
noon, where they extin-
guished a grass fire.

January 15, 1959 –

Construction progress is,
and will be booming in
Cunningham during the
next few months.

Construction has prac-
tically been completed
on the West Café, lo-
cated at the west city
limits of town. Builder
and owner, Roy Ellis has
leased the air-conditioned
building to Mrs. Elaine
Archibald of Kingman.
Mrs. Archibald expects
to open the café before
the end of January.

Melvin Oller has start-
ed construction of a build-
ing in the northeast part
of town. A. J. Gillen is
laying the rock at the
building site.

A tentative location of
the new co-op elevator
in Cunningham was re-
vealed this week by Santa
Fe Agent Ted Hazlett.

The elevator proper
(250,000 bushel capacity)
will be located across the
main track south and just
west of the present Gano
Grain Corp. elevator. Mr.
Hazlett said the co-op
elevator office and scales
will be located across the
main track south of the
depot.

The Santa Fe will
build a “loop” line from
their main track to accom-
modate the new elevator
facilities. Co-op officials
have requested enough
track for 18 cars, mak-
ing the loop about three
blocks long.

Delmer Huffman ex-
pects to start construction
as soon as possible on the
new Cunningham Post
Office.

Cunningham was oust-
ed from the Pretty Prairie
Invitational Basketball
Tournament, Wednesday
evening, by the host team,
38 to 31.

Bill Ridge and
Gary Raney paced the
Cunningham scoring with
nine points each. Center
Bill Murphey missed the
game due to a sprained
ankle.

January 14, 1954

Beverly Ann Amick,
lovely twenty-year-old
daughter of Mr. and Mrs.
Ray Amick, comes as a
great shock and grief to
this community.

Wildcats On Track with 71-53 Win

The Wildcats got back on the winning track Friday night, as they traveled to Bucklin to take on the Red Aces. It was going to be a tough game, mentally and physically, for us. It would be our first away game of the season and we were going to have to come back from a very tough game on Tuesday. We knew w might be draggy and not shoot well, still feeling the after affects. We did not have an

exceptionally strong game but kept running and fighting. Bucklin ran very well also, but we played fairly well on defense to keep us in the game. We got off to a strong start with Scott Huhman hitting 3 long shots, as we moved to an 11-4 lead. Joe Strohl also hit for 7 as Wildcats went up 20-8, with two minutes left in the quarter. We just couldn’t get anything to go down from that point, and Bucklin closed the gap to 20-10 at the quarter’s end.

The second quarter we did not play well at all. We were standing around on offense and getting too much one-on-one play. Bucklin was able to close the gap slightly 35-26 at half time.

The third quarter saw Bucklin make runs at us, but we seemed to get the basket or key effort on defense when needed. The wildcats went up 54-40 by the end of the quarter.

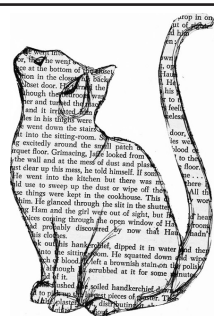
The final quarter the Wildcats increased their lead to 18 points early and held that edge to the end and the 71-53 victory. For the game the Wildcats hit 40.6 percent on 30 of the 74 shots, our worst shooting of the season. We did do a good job on the boards with 45 rebounds led by Joe Strohl with 12 and Tom Crawford with

10. We had 15 turnovers in the game, which was down considerably from the last game.

Joe Strohl led the Cats with 29 points; Schott Huhman had 14 points and 3 steals; Tom Crawford had 9; and Terry Elliot 8. Berry Bortz had 6 points and 7 rebounds. Brian DeWeese 2 Mike Beat 2, and Troy Rohr 1. Randy Hageman and Bill Osner came off the bench and played well but failed to score.

It was our final game before Christmas, using some fine defense and team work. I have been pleased with the effort that has been put out, and we will have to continue along this line to improve some areas. We will work hard on press this week, so we can use it along with our main-to-man defense after Christmas.

I hope everyone will get a chance to come to watch us. We will have several games after Christmas, beginning with Sharon on January 2 and Attica on Friday, January 5.

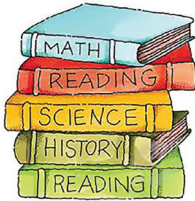

Money Tip for Students, December 2018: How to get in trouble with credit card debt

Students can get into trouble with credit card debt if they don’t take time to think about what they’re doing, according to KHEAA.

One quick way to get into trouble is to carry a high balance and pay only the minimum payment each month.

If you have a \$1,500 balance, your minimum payment might be \$30 a

month, since many credit card companies set the minimum payment at 2 percent of the balance. Let’s say your card carries a 22 percent interest rate. If you only pay \$30 a month and don’t charge anything else until you pay off the entire balance, it will take you more than 11 years to pay your balance down to zero — and you’ll pay \$2,600 in interest.

It’s worse, of course, if you pay the \$30 and turn around and charge another \$30.

That circle is especially bad for students. Many college officials say more students drop out because

they have to go to work to pay off their credit cards than because they flunk out.

Before using your credit card, ask yourself if you really need what you’re buying and if you can afford it. And if you can’t pay off the entire balance, pay as much as you can, not just the minimum.

A Bit of Something about Wildcats

Wildcat can reach 29 to 46 inches in length and 7 to 18 pounds of weight. Soft fur of wildcat can be grey-brown, yellowish-grey, dark grey, reddish or sandy colored and covered with various spots and stripes. Black-tipped tail is covered with dark rings.

Dark-colored wildcats with prominent spots and stripes often inhabit moist areas and forests. Wildcats from arid areas have pale-colored fur with less prominent markings.

Wildcat is an agile

climber, but it lives and hunts on the ground (terrestrial animal).

Wildcat has keen sense of hearing and eyesight which are used for detection of the prey during the night.

Its diet is based on rodents, birds, reptiles, insects and spiders. It occasionally hunts large prey such as rabbits, small deer and antelopes. Wildcat eats entire prey, including the feathers, fur and bones.

Wildcat can reach the speed of 30 miles per hour.

Really Unimportant Information about the Month of January

“The name, given to the month of ‘January’, is derived from the ancient Roman name ‘Janus’ who presided over the gate to the new year. He was revered as the ‘God of Gateways’, ‘of Doorways’ and ‘of the Journey.’ Janus protected the ‘Gate of Heaven’, known as the ‘Lord of Beginnings’,

is associated with the ‘Goddess Juno-Janus’, and often symbolized by an image of a face that looks forwards and backwards at the same time. This symbolism can easily be associated with the month known by many as the start of a new year which brings new opportunities. We cast out the

old and welcome in the new. It is the time when many reflect on events of the previous year and often resolve to redress or improve some aspect of daily life or personal philosophy.”

Various Christian feast dates were used for the New Year in Europe in the Middle

Ages, including March 25 and December 25. However, medieval calendars were displayed in the Roman fashion of twelve columns from January to December. Beginning in the 16th century, European countries began officially making January 1 the start of the New Year once again sometimes

called Circumcision Style because this was the date of the Feast of the Circumcision, being the 8th day from December 25.”

The Roman Senate, in 153 BC, declared January 1st to be the beginning of the new year. During the Middle Ages, the Church remained opposed to celebrating

New Year’s Day - it has only been celebrated in the western world for about 400 years.

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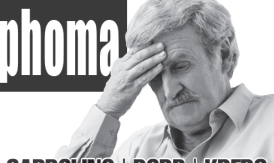

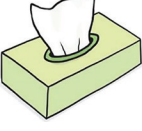
