YEARS AGO IN

The Cunningham Clipper

January 21, 1949

– The community was shocked Wednesday by the sudden death of Roy Huffman, a resident of this community for 38 years.

Mr. Huffman came to Cunningham in 1911 to assume his duties as Santa Fe depot agent, a position he maintained throughout the years until his retirement three years ago.

A native of the Goddard community, he had previously worked in the Cunningham station in 1907, but left here for Springfield, Missouri, where he was employed at the Western Union for several months. In 1908 he came to Kingman to work as telegraph operator in the Santa Fe offices, where he remained until his coming to Cunningham in 1911.

1944 – Publication suspended for the duration of the war.

January 20, 1939 – Isabel Man Killed in Accident – Last Saturday evening a very grave experience happened to Mrs. Earl Thompson of Isabel when she with her husband Earl were headed for Medicine Loge with a load of gasoline and oil.

They were about 7 miles south of Isabel and were coming down a hill when all at once their headlights flashed on a truck load of cattle that was parked on a narrow bridge. Seeing that it was either hit the cattle truck or the bridge which was too narrow to pass on, Earl chose what he thought was their safest and only chance by going over the grade. Due to the quick tightening of the brakes and the heavy load they had on their oil truck, the truck rolled over twice, throwing Mrs. Thompson clear but pinning Earl under the wreckage.

Mrs. Thompson is the daughter of Mrs. Julia Glenn of Cunningham and has lived all her life near Cunningham until her marriage nearly two years ago.

A merchant asked a farmer if he had seen the large sign recently erected. The farmer replied, “No, but if you will have a copy of the sign put in the newspaper and sent to my home where I do my reading, I will be glad to look it over.”

January 19, 1934 – Cunningham Grade School Happenings – Miss Morine has chosen “The Magic Beanstalk” as the operetta to be given by the grades this year. April 8th is the tentative date.

The basketball team will play Penalosa at that place Friday night as a preliminary to the High game.

The town B. B. team won to basket-ball games from the Zenda club last Monday at Zenda. The second team won by a score of 23 to 19 and the first team won by a 3-point lead, the game ending 32 to 29.

On the first team Cunningham was using three new-comers to the oil fields, Rex Kiff at forward, “Melt” Ingram, forward, and Jack Smith at guard with two locals, Alfred Tharp, guard, and William Slattery at center.

Tharp was high point man with his score running up in the “teens.”

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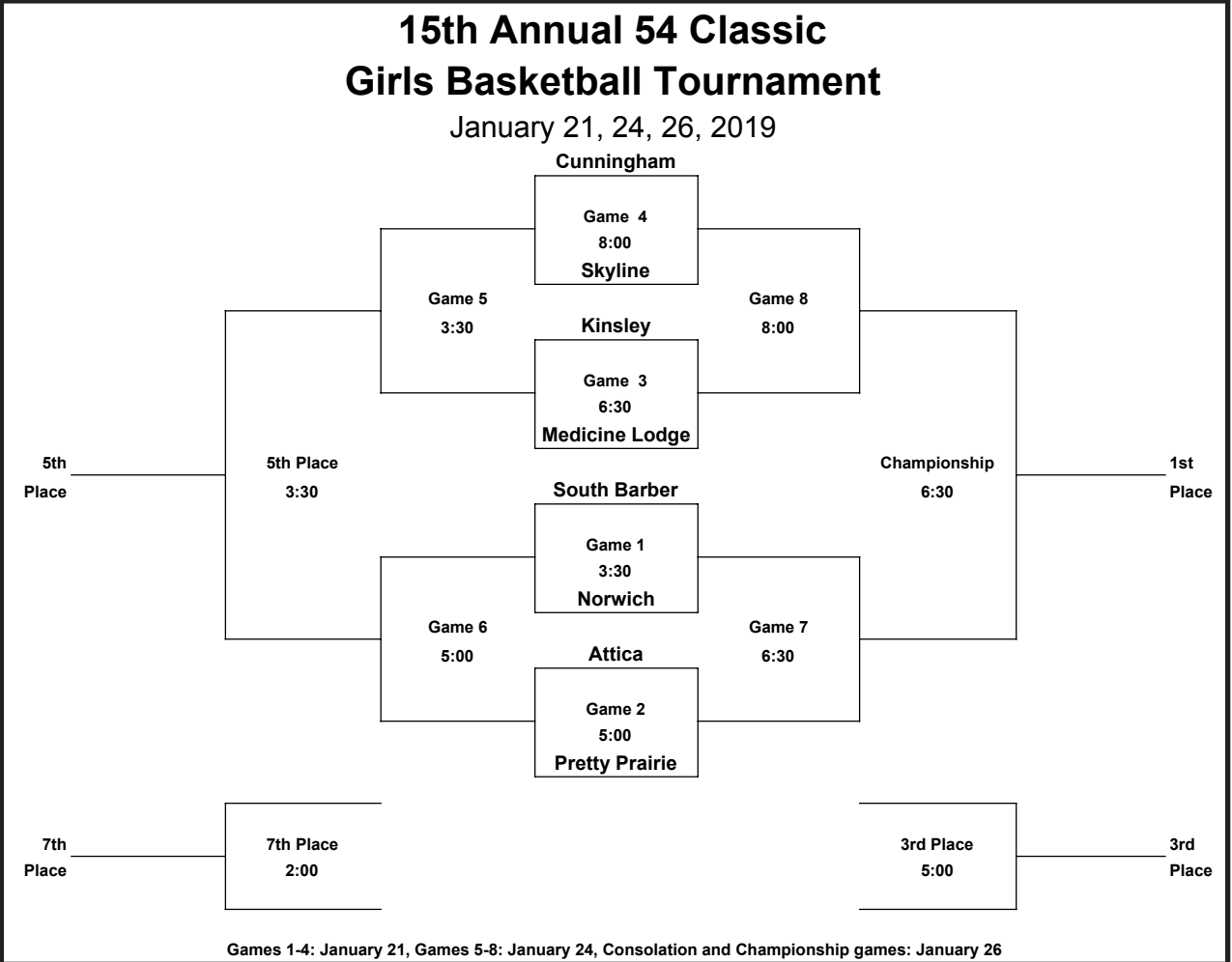
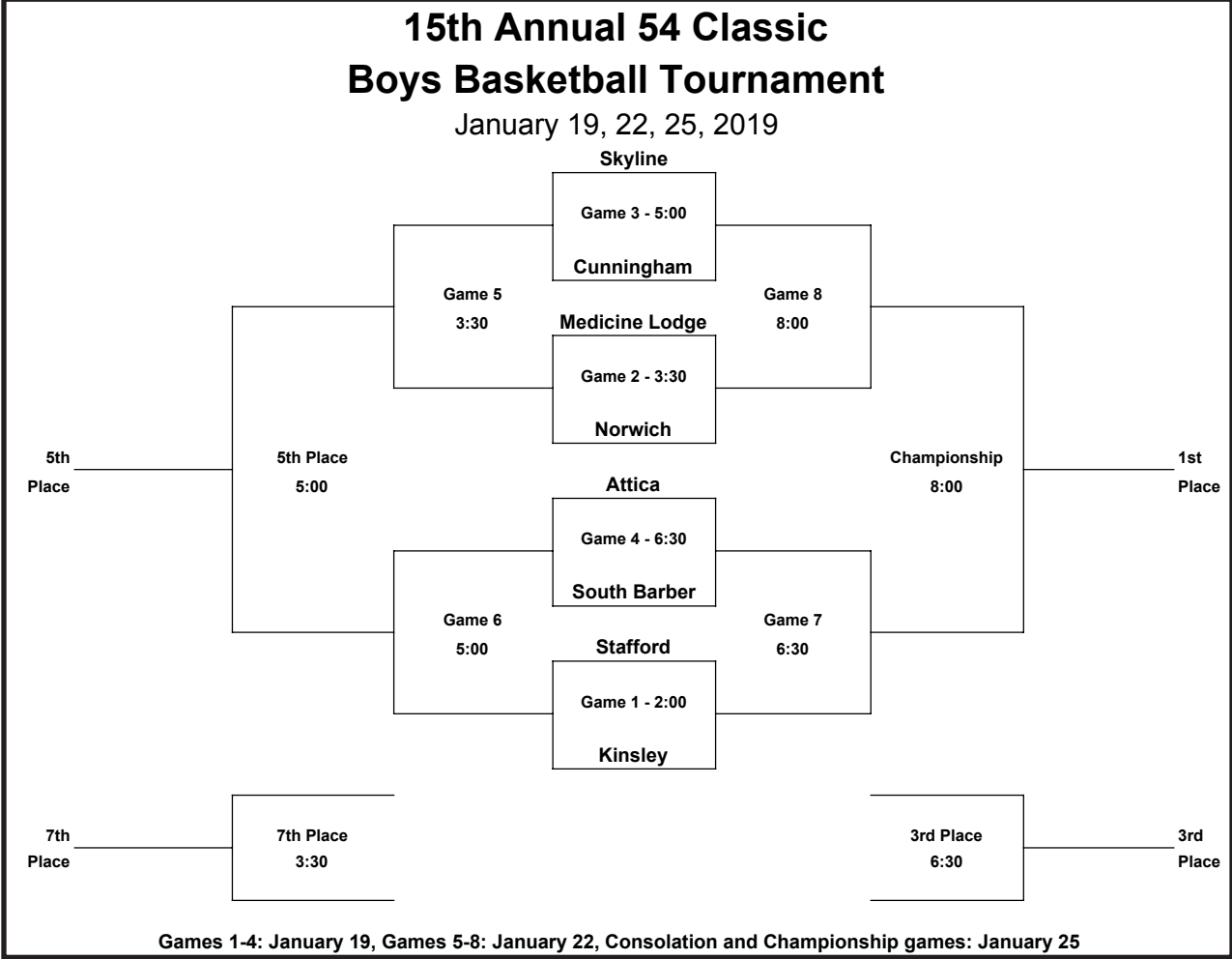

YEARS AGO IN

The Cunningham Clipper

January 23, 1964
– Shock and disbelief greeted state highway officials when they announced a proposal to relocate U.S. Highway 54 at a meeting in Kingman last Friday afternoon.

The proposal was an extension of US-54 double-lane plans from their present location at the “Andale Road” west of Wichita to the half-mile line north of the existing highway, and coming straight west, thereby missing the cities of Garden Plain, Kingman, Cunningham, and Pratt.

Attending the meeting from Cunningham were Mayor Francis Dafforn, Councilman Roy Ellis, and Dresden Trustee Bob Underwood.

January 22, 1959
– Workmen for the Diamond Engineering Company are now driving piling at the site of the new bridge across the Ninnescah River north of town.

A large trailer home belonging to a Minnesota man, was destroyed by fire late Saturday night while parked along Highway

54 in front of the Fee Hardware.

The owner, who had pulled his car and house trailer to that spot earlier in the evening, was asleep in the trailer at the time the fire broke out, but escaped before becoming trapped in the blaze.

The fire was thought to have started from a small heating stove.

Volunteer firemen brought the fire under control before it could spread to the business firm. One large window in the store was cracked from the heat of the fire.

January 22, 1954
– The high school basketballers chalked up their fourth straight win and their eighth victory of the current season, by swamping the Sawyer High School, 83 to 43, in a game played at Sawyer, Tuesday night.

The Wildcat’s center, six-foot seven-inch Ronnie Adelhardt, had the best night of his basketball career, as he poured 33 points through the hoop to pace the Cunningham scoring. Billy DeWeese and Victor Becker each scored 17 points to ably aid the Cunningham cause.

Members of the First Baptist Church of this city, greeted their new pastor, Rev. Charles McDonald, and family,

with a “Pound Party” at their home.

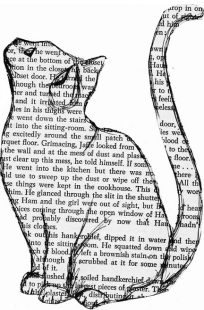

But sing I did, and one young fellow suggested maybe it would be better if I didn’t sing, because I wasn’t very good at it. I told him to eat his cupcakes and go get a drink of water at the fountain at the far end of the hall.

Shortly after this fiasco, Belle Plaine district calls, they desperately needed a kindergarten teacher and would I please, please come?

Because they were friends of mine, I stupidly agreed.

Circle time is first thing. You sing some songs, discuss shapes and numbers and the calendar, yada yada yada. Part way through circle time, one boy heads to the bathroom in the corner of the classroom.

Circle time is over. He’s still in there.

Here comes a young kid we’ll just call “Bub”, because that is short for Beezlebub. He has to go the bathroom, but Johnny is still in there. I go back and knock on the door and ask Johnny if he’s okay. Bub is being incredibly obnoxious about how hard it is for him to “hold” it.

No answer after my knock. Bub informs me Johnny doesn’t usually talk. I try the handle. Locked. I ask Bub where the key is. “Teacher has it.”

Bub asks if he can go and use the “big” bathroom down the hall.

Sure. Why not? And off Bub goes, skipping along like he’s riding a hobby horse.

I call the office and ask for a custodian. She comes down, unlocks the door, and there is the little guy, just playing with water in the sink.

I did NOT abandon ship.

I finally sent another young man to the bathroom to remind Bub to return to class. (I should have just left him down there.)

Well, I had a few minor mishaps, and the day didn’t get worse-- if I didn’t dwell on Bub’s obnoxious behavior.

The last hour of the day, the kids went to music and physical education. Made it.... except ...I’m getting panicky because they are late returning, and they still have to get their street shoes on and pack up their things and....

I finally went to the gym to get them. Another substitute. She’d lost track of time... SERIOUSLY? I’m checking off every minute that goes by, and how does someone lose track of time when you have kindergarteners????

As we are walking back to the classroom, which of course is at the other end of two long hallways. And I have kindergarteners who don’t understand hurry. And the first dismissal bell rings.

We run back to the classroom. One little girl goes to the bathroom. Others are talking. CHANGE YOUR SHOES! Who rides the bus? You need to get lined up! It’s time to get to the bus.

Bub pipes up, “I can’t find my shoes!”

"What do you mean? Where did you put them?"

“I left them right here by my desk.”

So I start searching. His buddies start searching. One kid climbs on a chair to look on the top of the closet, which I could see without climbing on top of the closet. Kids are crawling on the floor, under tables, looking in closets and boxes.

Bub is running around “Have you seen me shoes? Have you seen my shoes?”

Parents are starting to come in to pick up their darlings. One kind soul offers to take the kids to the bus.

Bub is running everywhere. I’m looking in bags and boxes. There are three moms there waiting for their little ones to round up their bookbags.

“Bub, you are just going to have to go home in your stocking feet!”

“WHAT? I can’t do that! I can wear my gymshoes home!”

"Nope. Just your socks."

The parents look at me funny. I don’t care. They’ve not spent the day with Bub.

“Look, Teacher, here they are! I joked you! I hid them in that basket over there! Isn't that funny?”

Three moms left the room. I want to believe they left because they didn’t want to witness a justifiable homicide, but I really think they were in the hall bent over laughing.

Good First Half Play Propels Lady Cats

Efficient. In a word, Coach Stackhouse accurately described in this way our first half play in our league opener at Attica, a 6-2 team when the night began. Attica canned a 3-pointer to get the scoring started,

but the Lady Cats would outscore the Bulldogs 13-2 for the remainder of the first quarter as five different players scored. A similar quarter would follow as we held a tight grip defensively while wasting few offensive possessions as we gained complete control in building a 27-9 halftime lead. I like our team’s chances in any game when we can manage a 1.00 point

per possession mark, and in the first and second quarters we operated at a 1.30 and 1.34 ppp clip. For the game, we ended with a 1.02 ppp measure, as we idled for most of the 3rd quarter in scoring 8 points before scoring 10 in the final frame to end the game with a 41-27 win.

Our shooting finally returned to a good place as we threatened the 50%

mark on 16 of 33, but free throw shooting – just 4 of 9 – is aging me. Morgan Meyers paced all scorers with 15 while Holly DeWeese was right on her heels with 10 of her own. Solid scoring contributions also came from Lauren Murphy (6), Maddison Panek (6), and Mackenzie Wright (4). Alayna McGuire did not score, but her defense is real, and she held Attica’s

most dangerous scorer below her average, so in that sense, her contributions were in fact reflected on the scoreboard, although indirectly.

We turned the ball over only 9 times, the second consecutive game with single digit turnovers. Maddison and Holly each collected 6 rebounds while Morgan added 5 and Alayna 3. Holly and Morgan shared

the lead for steals with 2 apiece. As for assists, Morgan handed out 5.

Back home we return for a Friday game against Pretty Prairie followed by a rare Monday game at Stafford, both leading up to our midseason tournament at Skyline.

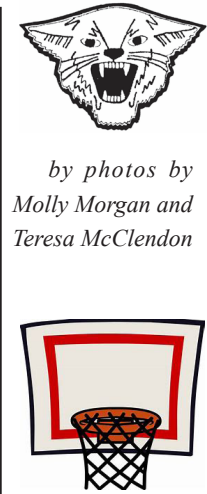

Red Cross issues emergency call for blood donors

Fewer drives, busy holiday schedules lead to blood shortage

WICHITA, Kan. (Jan. 14, 2019) — A donation shortfall over the winter holidays is prompting the American Red Cross to issue an emergency call for blood donors to give now to prevent a blood shortage from continuing throughout winter and affecting patient care.

The Red Cross collected more than 27,000 fewer blood and platelet donations the weeks of Christmas and New Year’s than needed to

sustain a sufficient blood supply. During this period, about 1,350 fewer blood drives were hosted by volunteer sponsor groups than required to meet patient needs as busy holiday schedules kept many donors away.

“Many people may not realize that blood products are perishable, and the only source of lifesaving blood for patients is volunteer blood donors,” said Cliff Numark, senior vice president, Red Cross Biomedical Services. “When donations decline – as they did around the holidays and may further decline if severe winter weather and flu season pick up – lifesaving medical treatments could be delayed.”

Right now, the Red Cross has less than a three-day supply of most blood types on hand, well below the ideal five-day supply needed to respond to emergencies and daily hospital needs. Blood products are currently being distributed to hospitals faster than donations are coming in.

“We hope people can resolve to save lives now – when there is an emergency need – as well as throughout the year,” added Numark.

All eligible donors, especially blood donors with type O blood, are urged to make an appointment to give in the coming days to help restock the shelves for hospital patients. Eligible donors can find

a blood donation opportunity and schedule an appointment to donate by using the free Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767). Volunteer blood drive hosts are also critically needed to prevent the shortage from worsening this winter.

Winter weather poses risk to blood supply

With several weeks of winter ahead, severe winter weather poses an additional threat to an already low blood supply. Snow, ice and extreme temperatures last January and February forced hundreds of blood drive cancellations, causing about 23,000 blood and platelet donations to go un-

collected. In December, winter weather resulted in nearly twice the number of uncollected blood and platelet donations as December 2017.

Who blood donations help

In May 2018, 4-year-old Branson Gibby was diagnosed with neuroblastoma, a rare type of childhood cancer that affects certain types of nerve tissue after complaining of pain in his arms and legs and running a fever. After many tests, his mother, Erica Austin, was given the news that no mother ever wants to hear: her son had cancer.

Branson’s 18-month treatment plan includes many rounds of grueling chemotherapy, surgery to remove the tumor

near his kidney and spinal cord, stem cell transplants, and possibly radiation. He has already endured several lengthy hospital stays and began receiving the first of his stem cell transplants this fall.

Since his diagnosis, Branson has received 12 blood and 11 platelet transfusions. Of the transfusions, Austin said, “They have been so important to keep him as healthy, active and battle-ready, as possible. This is the hardest thing our family has ever faced. However, there is hope in the generosity of strangers who are helping to heal my brave boy. Blood and platelet donations truly are the gift of life.”

Acute Bronchitis

If you’ve been up all night coughing, experienced increased fatigue or body aches, as well as some soreness in your chest, you may be battling acute bronchitis. Acute bronchitis is swelling in your lungs and increased mucus production caused by an acute infection. You may experience a cough with or without mucus production, as well as mild headache, mild body aches, sore throat, and watery eyes. Most often, acute bronchitis is caused by a virus, but even in cases where a bacteria is the cause of the infection, antibiotics are not recommended unless your symptoms have lasted longer than 3 weeks. You are most contagious the first 3-7 days of the illness, even though your symptoms may last longer than that. It can seem like a very long three weeks of waiting

out your symptoms, but you can utilize some supportive treatments to help improve symptom severity. Ensure you are getting plenty of rest, stay hydrated, use lozenges, humidified air, and over the counter pain relievers when appropriate. Honey has been proven to work for a cough suppressant, and is safe in most children over the age of one. Many over the counter cough and cold preparations aren’t suitable for young children, so contact your healthcare provider before administration. Most adults can use over the counter medications indicated for cough and colds, but check with your primary care provider to ensure you can take them with any previously prescribed medications or medical conditions.
